Health of the Russian Army Growing Worse.

War Items.

MANCHESTER, June 6.—The Guardian's Vienna dispatch says that since the commencement of the great heat, the health of the Russian army has become worse. Financial difficulties are apparent during the last fortnight; the troops have not received the additional war money above their regular pay and the Czar takes command of the army, chiefly because the Grand Duke Nicholas and his chief of staff General Neperovitch, frequently disagree. After the Czar's arrival, a state of siege will be proclaimed at Bucharest, and a Russian town commander be appointed.

A Constantinople dispatch says: By order of the Minister of War, the local journals are forbidden to publish any matter relating to the war.

VIENNA, June 6.—The opinion gains ground that the Russians will not cross the Danube.

The securities in Asia, relied upon as a lever to peace, are satisfactory to Russia's ideas of an honorable retreat from the war.

LONDON, May 5.—The Czar arrived at Ploesti last night. Count Schouvaloff, the Russian Ambassador here, arrived at Berlin to-day. He will reach London on Friday.

The Bath and West of England societies' centenary was celebrated at Bath to-day.

A cable special reports the Czar's arrival at headquarters in Roumania. The weather has turned very hot, and sickness is increasing.

Russia's finances trouble her. She is 12,000,000 francs in arrears to Roumania.

A large number of special police have preceded the Czar on his way to Bucharest.

A special to the News from Pesh, states that despite all denials, it is positively asserted that Servia has made complete preparations to commence hostilities near Ak Palanka and Alt Nisch, as soon as the Russians have crossed the Danube.

BERLIN, June 6.—The Post intimates that a diplomatic conference may be held at Bucharest during the sojourn of the Czar.

The semi-official journals at St Petersburg, advertising the peace rumors, says that diplomacy had better not pronounce in favor of any definite plan for the termination of war, until decisive events have occurred on the battle field. The terms of peace must depend on the course of the war.

LONDON, June 6.—The suspension bridge fell to-day. About a hundred persons were precipitated 30 feet into the river. At noon eight dead bodies were recovered. It is feared that others perished. Many were injured.

Another account represents the disaster as much more serious.

LATER.—Later intelligence from the Bath bridge disaster, says 20 bodies were recovered, and several are still missing. Nearly 200 people were on the bridge when it fell.

STILL LATER.

BATH, June 6.—The bridge was wooden and of light construction, about 30 feet long, and between thirty and forty feet above the river Avon, resting upon posts, morticed into stone work at either end, and without a centre support.

The bridge snapped in the centre, and the two ends were wrenched clear from the abutments; the whole mass with the people on it was plunged into the middle of the stream, which was about seven feet deep. Boats from the shore were immediately at work rescuing the living and searching for the dead.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 6.—The Khedive has instructed the Porte, in view of Earl Derby's dispatch to Lord Lyons the British Ambassador at Paris, which was laid on the table of the House of Commons yesterday, that if the Porte determines to refuse Russia the navy

rights to pass through the Suez Canal, it must send men of war to defend its entrances.

LONDON, June 6.—An official report was received at Constantinople to-day from the Governor of Herzegovina which confirms the reported defeat of the Montenegrins and Herzegovinians on the 4th inst., in the defiles of Kristev with heavy loss, by Sultan Pasha.

HAVANA, June 6.—A decree has been issued declaring that as the authorities of Cuba and Porto Rico, had come to an understanding respecting the introduction of Porto Rico tobacco into the island of Cuba, therefore importation of the same, is allowed only at Havana, and prohibited at all other ports of the island. The tobacco, before passing the custom house, is to be submitted to the strict examination of a competent commissioner, to prevent the introduction of a foreign article.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.

Butler has written a diffuse column to McVeigh, denying certain assertions attributed to him by McVeigh. Butler says: "On the contrary, I was told that although the money was promised as a bribe for the desertion, the poor fellows did not get it, but were required further to vote for Mr. Spofford as Senator before they could get even what was due them. Now I do not know this fact, but hope and believe the Senate will ascertain it at the investigation in the contest for the Senator's seat. The extract I read in your letter, wherein you say Wharton did not manage or transact any kind of business for me. Certainly not, bless your soul, you do not call such tricks as these business, do you? They are not business, even if you should get that foreign mission for doing them, which I, hope you will. You further say Wharton was a friend of Packard. All the better instruments, therefore, to get Packard's friends away from him. It was well done, and does credit to your training." Extract: "Every one has his own taste in choosing his way to acquire money, but if I were obliged to choose one of two ways, either to appropriate it as a military commandant, or to marry into a family where I was neither wanted nor by which I should be respected, so get money to spare, I certainly should choose the former, strange as you may think it, because at least I should have the money after having committed a disreputable act to get it, and not liable to be disappointed as I might be after I had waited long for 'dead men's shoes' by the other method."

Collector King has sent a number of nominations here for the fortunate places in the New Orleans Custom House, but they have been advised that changes are not desirable until after the investigation.

The Secretary of State telegraphed through the Department of the Treasury and Justice to Key West, to ascertain officially all the particulars bearing upon the intrigue on the American flag, committed by a Spanish man of war, in boarding the American whaling schooner Ellen Riprap, of Providence.

Learning by newspaper publications that a filibustering expedition is being fitted out at New Orleans in aid of the Cuban insurrection, Secretary Evarts has ordered an investigation of the matter. If the statement is correct, Evarts will endeavor to have the persons engaged in the project arrested and punished.

Railroad Strike Ended.

A Quarter of a Million for Six

NEW YORK, June 6.—The strike among the laborers on the passenger and freight depots of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, has ended. A committee of laborers called upon several prominent merchants in this city yesterday for advice, and were told to resume work as soon as possible, at the best compromise offered by the railroad officials. So, at a meeting this morning, it was decided to resume work at the compromise rate of fourteen cents per hour. After having reports of the company, the men immediately resumed work.

The Times says that negotiations are progressing with Sweeney in the six million dollar suit, for a quarter of a million of dollars. The Times editorially condemns the compromise.

Four hundred and fifty thousand specie shipped to Europe to-day.

CONNECTICUT.

Insurance Building Transferred to the United States Treasurer.

NEW HAVEN, June 6.—The National Capital Life Insurance Company has transferred its building in this city, which cost 450 thousand dollars, to the Treasurer of the United States, to be held as security for the claims of policy holders. The building is to be held by the United States, until substituted by deposits with the Treasurer, of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars in bonds.
