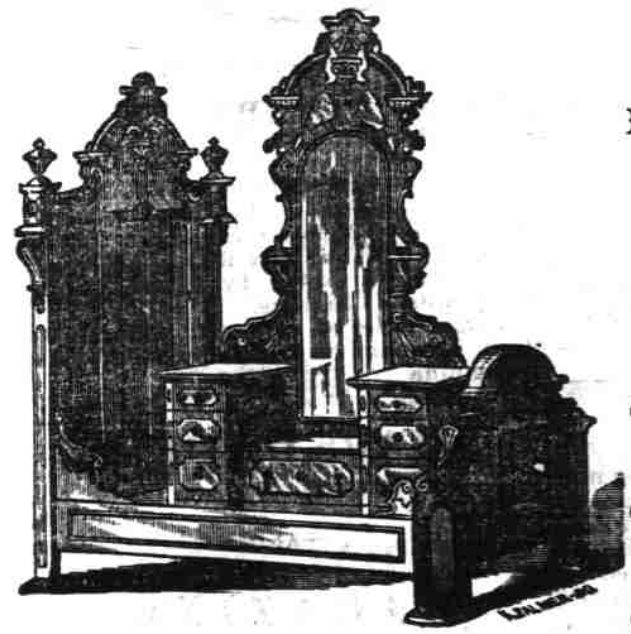

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

ACROSS THE WATERS.

Railway Communication Throughout Roumania Re-opened.

Active Preparations on Both Sides the Danube.

Turks Contemplating the Offensive.

Peace Terms Between Rousinia and Egypt.

Ill Feeling Between Russia and Roumania.

War Items.

LONDON, June 7.—While advices from Montenegro are conflicting, Nicosia appears seriously threatened.

VIENNA, June 7.—Railway communication throughout Roumania is re-opened.

The Grand Duke Michael, commander of the army of Caucasus, left Tiflis on Tuesday for Alexandropolis.

BUCHAREST, June 7.—Extensive preparations are being made at Galatz.

A large quantity of chain cables are accumulated at this depot. The places on the Danube whither this material will be moved, are not known.

Bands of Russian soldiers frequently cross the river at Galatz, and make their way as far as the hills opposite the city.

The object of these reconnoissances, is not so much to ascertain the position of the Turkish troops, which is already well known, as to watch the progress of the water on the flats.

Increased activity on both sides of the Danube is reported.

Spies report that the Turks intend to attempt some offensive movement.

The weather has greatly improved in both the Asiatic and European seats of war.

ERZERUM, June 7.—The archives of this city have been sent to Erzingan.

There is a rumor that the Cossacks have been seen at Ispir, in the valley of Tchuruk.

Communication with Trebizond will probably be interfered with.

The Soghant Mountain is now practicable for troops on all sides.

BELGRADE, June 7.—The Skuptschina will hold its next session exceptionally at Kragujevatz.

ALEXANDRIA, June 7.—The terms of peace between Abyssinia and Egypt are as follows: The old frontiers are restored, and free trade intercourse and mutual consular relations are to be established.

ROME, June 7.—The receipts of the Vatican from the Pope's jubilee were six and a half million lire in gold, exclusive of valuable presents.

LONDON, June 7.—A Pesh dispatch to the Times has the following: A telegram received here announces that the commandant at Ogram has published an order forbidding any member of the reserves to leave his place of residence.

Several specials confirm the report. Bucharest is about to be proclaimed in a state of siege.

The Russian police, owing to the reputation of Roumania as a gathering place for Poles and other turbulent characters, deem it necessary to take even more than usually severe precautions for the safety of the Czar, so as well as sending the host of secret police, they demanded the unlimited right of arresting suspicious individuals.

The Roumanian government refused to grant this because it was in direct violation both of Russo-Roumanian convention, and the constitution of the country.

The Grand Duke Nicholas manifested his displeasure at the refusal, by taking no notice of Prime Minister Bratianu, and M Gogalniceanu, foreign minister, when they went to meet him on the occasion of his last visit to Bucharest.

The Roumanian government though it has yet made no sign of yielding, will probably compromise by consenting to proclaim a state of siege, which would permit the exceptional measures desired by the Russians.

In other respects, matters do not appear to be going quite smoothly. The Russians are complaining of the ill will and dilatoriness of the Roumanian authorities, and the latter of the offensive and almost brutal behavior of the Russian officers.

BUCHAREST, June 7.—It is reported here that the peace negotiations have entirely failed.

Among the large number of Circassian prisoners passing through Jassy recently on their way to Siberia, 14 Poles who had deserted from the Russian army, were discovered and shot.

Specials say the Sultan is expected to join the army sometime next month.

A court martial is about to assemble to try the Circassian regiments in the Russian service, who mutinied and refused to serve against the Turks.

RAUBA, June 7.—The Consuls here

have information that the Turks have been defeated on the Southern frontier. Fighting continues in the vicinity of the Duga Pass.

PROSENY, June 7.—Prince Charles of Roumania arrives to-day, to visit the Czar.

WASHINGTON!

Hayes in Favor of Remonetizing the Old Silver Dollar.

Evarts Insistent on Cuba, not Mexico.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Governor Young, of Ohio, who stopped with Hayes, shows a letter, in which, when declining the nomination for Governor he says: "The leading men of both parties are agreed on the necessity of remonetizing the old silver dollar."

An expert in finance, says this would be inflation beyond the wildest dreams of the greenbackers.

It appears to be the Cuban, instead of the Mexican expedition, that is fitting out at New Orleans, with which Mr. Evarts wants to meddle.

In view of the President's intention, to have the Federal offices, principal and subordinate, of Louisiana, divided among the three elements of the party, native Republicans, carpet-baggers, and colored people, the colored delegation now here, are said to have been advised by the friends of the President, to name their candidate for their third and to abstain from any interference, in the situation of the other two thirds. They have been advised if they insist upon controlling the entire State, they will fail entirely in the object for which they are here.

Banks is not considered for the French mission.

MIDNIGHT

WASHINGTON, June 7.—J. S. Payne, son of Bishop Payne, of the Southern Methodist Church, is mentioned in connection with the position of Sergeant-at-Arms of the House.

Lieutenant Frederick Grant has been detailed to locate a mail line in the Black Hills.

Colonel Rogers, the President's Private Secretary, has returned.

Senator Ishamly Harris is at the Ebbitt House.

The President was this evening presented with a colossal bust of himself, by the Louisiana Constitutional Union Association of New Orleans.

The present was accompanied by a communication of presentation of the Association, Judge Sloanaker acting as their representative. It is in Terms Colts, by J. G. Beldin.

E. W. Barber, Third Assistant Postmaster General, has resigned. The resignation surprised Key. A. D. Hazan, chief of the Stamp Division, succeeds Barber.

It was decided in the Cabinet on Thursday, to make no change in the office of Recorder of Deeds. Simon Wolf, the present incumbent, will remain in office.

Attorney General Devens is quoted as no action, looking to the supercedure of Marshal Fayner, or District Attorney Meyer, of Alabama, has been taken.

Oliver H. Dockery, of North Carolina, is heavily endorsed for Consul General at London, or to succeed Gen Badeau.

The Southern Memorial Association decorated the graves of the Confederate soldiers buried at Arlington, to day. Quite a number of people gathered from Washington, Georgetown, Alexandria, and the surrounding country. There was no demonstration beyond flowers, prayers and tears.

Schurz has organized a commission to investigate the Indian Bureau.

OHIO.

The Greenback State Ticket Nominated.

COLUMBUS, June 7.—The Greenback Convention, with thirty delegates, assembled to-day. Its resolutions demand the unconditional repeal of the legal tender act, and the remonetization of silver. The full State ticket is nominated, headed by Stephen Johnson, for Governor.

SOUTH CAROLINA

Wright Impeached by the House --The Supply Bill

Gen Kershaw Carpenter's successor.

COLUMBIA, June 7.—The House has impeached Associate Justice Wright, who, pending the trial, is suspended from office.

With regard to the bonded debt, while no direct appropriation is made in the appropriation bill, for the payment of the interest in the public debt, yet the levy is made, and specifically appropriated for that purpose, in the supply bill, and the result is virtually the same.

COLUMBIA, June 7.—The Joint Assembly to-day elected Gen J B Kershaw, of Camden, successor to Judge A B Carpenter, of the 5th Circuit. Gen Kershaw received 128 out of the 180 votes cast.

VIRGINIA.

Tobacco Agent Suspended.

RICHMOND, June 7.—Horace W Beckmure, agent for the sale of manufactured tobacco has suspended. Liabilities reported \$20,000. He claims to be able to pay dollar for dollar, and resume business shortly. He did a large business South and West, and his embarrassment is due to the return of a large amount of Southern paper unpaid.

GEORGIA.

Charged With Breaking Mail.

AUGUSTA, June 7.—W E Arnett, clerk in the Augusta postoffice, has been arrested on the charge of opening letters. Arnett was taken before the Commissioner, and waiving examination gave bond for his appearance before the United States District Court.

Love and Death.

Graphic description of a Picture. M. D. Conway sends to the Cincinnati Commercial the following graphic description of G. F. Watts' great picture "Love and Death," first exhibited to the public in London this spring:

"He who looks on this picture looks as if through a pane in a man's breast. To a door where just now roses were climbing and doves ascending, the great draped form of Death has approached. We do not see the form of Death, his back is toward us, and we only see that he is a giant whose heavy foot is planted on the door-step, his pallid, powerful arm stretched out till his hand rests on the door that must open to him. Already a torn and fallen branch of an outer climbing rose marks where has passed the power that spares no beauty, and near his feet crouches a poor dove with torn feathers—one dove alone. At the door Love has planted himself to defend the entrance—a slender, naked boy, as it might be of thirteen or fourteen summers. One slender arm is strained against the giant's breast, another small hand is thrown back over the shoulder, as if to try and clutch the door, which Death's hand has reached over his (Love's) head. In the struggle the wings of Love have become a many-colored tangle of broken feathers. But it is the face of the boy that is most pathetic. Amid the struggles he gazes up into the face of his great antagonist with an expression blended of fear and piteous anguish. There is also a look of the exhaustion of strength, and the last pleading for mercy. The head of Death is gently inclined downwards towards that of Love, but the form stands firm as marble; the outstretched arm is inexorable."
