WASHINGTON.

Squabbling Over the Spoils.

On the Ragged Edge.

More Returning Board Willows Uncertain.

More Appointments.

Sherman Favoring the Renomination of the Silver Dollar.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—Frank Richardson, of the Baltimore Sun, who has kept a close track of Louisiana affairs, telegraphs to his paper: "Another scandal, in relation to the Louisiana Returning Board, has just come to light. When the members of the board were here last winter, in custody for contempt of the House of Representatives, certain sympathizing Senators and members raised a purse amounting to 1100 dollars for them. The money was put in the hands of one of the white members of the board, and it now appears that neither of the colored members got any part of it, although they were compelled to borrow money to get home."
Louis S. Sower is being pressed by Kellogg for Ringgold's place. The colored delegation here strongly insist upon Ringgold's retention.
Cockrell's position, in which he is very strongly fortified, is attacked by Chas. H. Thompson, whose endowments are formidable.
Wharton and Leonard are still on a very ragged edge.
Special Cabinet meeting. G. G. Potts was appointed postmaster at Petersburg, Va.; Gen. J. Wharton was appointed marshal of Louisiana, vice Pitkin, suspended. B. Long was appointed secretary to the President, to sign land warrants.
The Star says that Secretary Sherman is in favor of the renomination of silver for all purposes, for which the United States notes are now used as legal tender. He does not favor the use of silver in the payment of custom duties.
Senator Ferry is not seriously sick. The mints of the country, will remain idle from the first to the middle of July, for repairs.
Chas. C. Shepard, consul at Leeds, has been promoted to the Consulship at Bradford.
Mr. Wilson, of Iowa, a friend of Secretary McCrary, succeeds Shepard, at Leeds.
The Secretary of the State, has information from the Federal authorities at New Orleans, that there is no foundation for the rumor of a Cuban expedition from that port.
The Cabinet meeting to-day, was to consider the proposition of the syndicate, and resulted in accepting their proposition, which is in effect, the placing of \$25,000,000 4 per cent, and \$250,000 4 per cent bonds.

ACROSS THE WATERS.

Turkish Officers Shot for the Loss of Ardahan.

Severe Turkish Defeat—3,600 Left Dead on the Field.

Montenegrins Reinforced.

Romanian Railroads the Cause of the Delay.

The Turks About to Bombard Odessa.

Russians Repulsed while Attempting to Cross the Danube.

Bulgaria to be Occupied by Russians.

War Items.

LONDON, June 9.—Several Turkish officers have been shot in consideration of the loss of Ardahan. According to Montenegrin accounts, the Turks moved in two columns, one going to the relief of Goranska, and the main force under Sulim Pacha, to Kratz. The latter column attacked the entrenchments of Gen. Vukovics with great gallantry, but were repulsed, being twice driven back on their reserves.
The third attack was also repulsed, and the Turks were taking up a position opposite Kratz, where they remained when the last courier left. In spite of this alleged third repulse of the Turks, the account proceeds to state, that Gen. Vukovics fell back on his second line of the Duga, at 3 o'clock next morning, where he has not been molested. It appears from this report which certainly does not unduly exaggerate the success of the Turks, that if Gen. Vukovics' position were not actually stormed, he is placed in such a position as to be obliged to abandon them. The account continues: The Turkish loss in dead in this engagement is about three thousand six hundred. The dead were counted in front of the entrenchments of one Montenegrin battalion.
The other Turkish column going to Goranska, was met by Gen. Social and driven back to Muravitza, where it was encamped at latest information. As the defeat of this column would leave the rear of Suliman Pacha's army exposed, it is probable he will attack Gen. Social before moving on Gen. Vukovics again.
From Vienna the news comes that Prince Nikita has sent reinforcements to the Montenegrins, after their defeat at Kratz, and that they have taken up a position at Presjeka, towards the end of the Duga Pass, in the direction of Nicos, where probably another attempt will be made to stop Suliman Pacha on his way to provisions; that place. But for this purpose only a portion of the force could be spared, as the Turkish invasion threatens Montenegro from a third side, to which hitherto no attention seems to have been paid; namely from Sibiritz.
The report of this third diversion in favor of the Turks seems undoubtedly true, being confirmed by Turkish official bulletins, and from other more reliable sources.
LONDON, June 9.—The Turkish journals, assert that Hobart Pasha has left Varna with a Turkish squadron to bombard Odessa.
A dispatch to the News from Vienna states that a state of siege having been proclaimed in Roumania, telegrams concerning the military movements, henceforth will be stopped.
A Bucharest dispatch to the Times says: "One great cause of the proclamation of the state of siege was the delay and unsatisfactory working of the Roumanian railways. All railway officials are now brought under submission to the military authorities."
The Times in its leading article confirms its Paris correspondent's summary of Prince Gortschakoff's letter.
A Vienna dispatch to the Telegraph says: "The Russians not only intend to occupy Bulgaria, but have made all arrangements for moving at least three guns in the village of Adrianople."
The Post says Russian merchants in the Baltic ports are reported to be clearing wharves and warehouses by exporting all goods as fast as possible, under the apprehension of general prohibition.
A Reuter telegram from Constantinople dated yesterday, and Enzeroum dated the 6th inst., contain the following: The Montenegrins are cannonading Spuz, and a Russian force has reached Ardahan, and four battalions of garrison of Ardahan have reached Enzeroum. The Governor will be court martialled. There has been a skirmish with the advance of the Russian right wing near Nariman.
Mukhtar Pasha has sent a force to cut the communications of the Russian right and centre.
There is no news from Kratz.
The Russians attempted to cross the Danube in force between Nikopolis and Sistova on Friday, but were repulsed.
