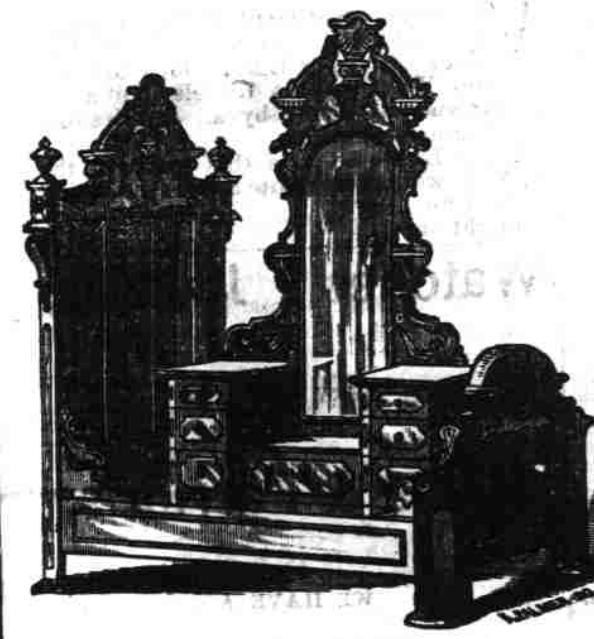

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### WASHINGTON!

Franks' Trial Attracting Great Attention.

Marshal Douglass Ready to Testify.

Great Fraud to be Exposed.

The Louisiana Colored Committee Disobeying Caucus Instructions.

Fifteen Million of 1865 Consols Called.

Tornado Out West.

The Secretary of the Navy on an Inspecting Tour.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The trial of Franks, United States deputy marshal, of North Carolina, attracts great attention. Attorney General Devens is represented as being determined to raise the standard of the service, by getting rid of persons of questionable integrity. A prominent detective says that when the whole thing is brought to light, the ramifications of this ring of fraud and its works, are exposed, the details will be startling. Equally big frauds, the detective says, exist in other Southern districts. Marshal Douglass, of North Carolina, is here to testify in Franks' case. It is estimated that one third of the expenditures of the department, have been for political, and another third for personal purposes.

Senator Dumont, of the Louisiana colored committee, expresses disgust with the action of his colleagues, in not adhering to the instructions of the caucus, which sent them here. This disregard of the wishes of the caucus, he says, was not by any means confined to the case of Pitkin.

The Republican has a strong deprecatory article on the President's action in the Louisiana marshal case.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The Secretary of the Treasury, has called in 15 millions of the consols of 1865. Interest ceases September the 11th.

The Maine and Virginia delegations, of the stone cutters, called upon the proper authorities, asking that the cutting for the public buildings, be done under a government superintendent, and protection against the reduction of wages.

The camp of the Ponck Indians moving into the Indian Territory, was struck by a tornado. One was killed and several hurt, and the camp prostrated.

The government has printed no one or two dollar bills since the first of April.

Post office commissions were issued to-day to Col. Forbes, of Richmond, Virginia, and Mrs. Thompson, of Louisville.

The Secretary of the Navy leaves to-morrow, on an inspecting tour. Rear Admiral Howell acts during the Secretary's absence.

The Secretary of War, leaves to-morrow for West Point.

### PENNSYLVANIA.

#### Miners' Strike.

POTTSVILLE, June 11.—On Saturday, the miners and boys, to the number of 1,100, employed at the lower collieries of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Company, in the vicinity of Coalbrook and Lansford, in the upper Lehigh region, struck against a reduction of wages, which went into effect June 1st. At noon to-day, a mass meeting of men will be held to discuss the situation. It is known that a general reduction of wages will be made in that region; and it is thought that the strikers will be obliged to resume work at a reduced rate of compensation.

### NEW YORK.

#### Accident to a Noted Lawyer.

NEW YORK, June 11.—Hon. Clarkson N. Potter was thrown from his carriage, at his residence, in New Rochelle, on Friday, and had a rib fractured. Consequently, he will not be able to deliver his promised address at Roanoke College, in Virginia, to-morrow evening.

Ex-Gov. Hendricks and wife are here, and will for Europe Wednesday, remaining abroad three or four months.

### FLASHES.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 11.—Non-union printers are working on the North American, at 35 cents per thousand.

FRINGFIELD, Mass., June 11.—Jared White, colored, was arrested to-day, for the murder of Harriet Wheeler, whose body was found in the woods at Halfeld, a week since.

## ACROSS THE WATERS.

The Turks Preparing to Check the Russian Attempt to Cross the Danube.

Russian Torpedo Boats Driven Off by Turkish Iron Clads.

The Fate of Nicosis Dependent on a Battle.

Germany Becoming Alarmed at the French Attitude.

The Report of the Capture of a Provision Train Unfounded.

Where and How the Russians Propose Crossing the Danube.

Turkish Facilities for Opposing the Crossing.

### War Items.

LONDON, June 11.—The Times' Vienna dispatch says: The Turks are collecting an army of reserves Westward of Sofia.

The garrison at Widdin is being reduced, a part of the troops still remaining there, being detached to strengthen the army in the field. It is intended by the Turks apparently, to oppose the Russian host, which is expected to cross in the neighborhood of Nicopolis and Sistova. Hobart Pasha has taken measures for securing the Sulina mouth of the Danube, and for a strict blockade of Odessa.

Eight hundred Circassians are reported to have been sent to Tatar Bazarjik, to be distributed among the Bulgarian villages, in order to repress any attempt at insurrection.

The Times' dispatch from Therapia says: News has just arrived of an encounter between 6 Russian torpedo boats and some Turkish iron clads at Sulina at the mouth of the Danube. The torpedo boats were beaten off. Three were destroyed and some prisoners taken. One of the iron clads was injured.

The Vienna correspondent of the Times says: No fresh news has been received from Montenegro. Both sides are evidently making preparations to deal a decisive blow. The difficult task of forcing an entrance from the Duga Pass into the plain of Nicosis, still remains for Suleiman Pasha. In this, neither Ali Sahib nor Mohamed Ali can assist him much.

The Times' correspondent at Montenegrin headquarters says: Reports that a provision train for Garanska was captured are unfounded. The fortress was retaken after four hour's fighting. This success enables Suleiman Pasha to concentrate his force for an attack on Gen. Vukovic's position in the Duga Pass. The Montenegrin army will be concentrated to meet him, and the battle will be decisive of the fate of Nicosis. It is thought probable that Suleiman Pasha though losing heavily, will penetrate to Nicosis. If he should be defeated, his army will extricate itself with great difficulty, and will risk total destruction.

LONDON, June 11.—The Times' dispatch from Rome says: The French Ambassador to the Holy See has left Rome for Paris, whither he has been suddenly recalled.

The Daily News' correspondent at Berlin telegraphs: A very serious impression has been caused by articles yesterday and to-day published in the National Zeitung, discussing the crisis in France, declaring that an ultra-montane regime, which alone could succeed the Republic, is irreconcilable with European peace. I know these articles reflect very faithfully the views of government circles here. Information that the French are already renewing their military preparations on the frontier is received here with credit.

LONDON, June 11.—A special dispatch from Vienna to the Times has the following: It would appear that the Russian points for crossing the Danube will be chosen east and west of the Turkish quadrilateral, and that while the eastern column keeps in check the Turkish forces massed in and about the fortresses, the western column will act as a field army, operating against the flank or rear of the Turkish positions. The line chosen for the operation of the western column is a most advantageous one, for along it lie some very fair roads over the Balkans, one from Plennia and Sofia, and another from Sistova over the Siftha Pass towards Philippopolis.

Although the Turks are outnumbered by the Russians, and although with the greatest exertion they will scarcely be able to oppose anything like an equivalent force to the four corps concentrated by the Russians on that side, yet by taking up a central position between Plennia and Bela, with the help of monitors and batteries, they may throw considerable obstacles in the way of crossing.

PANAMA, June 2.—By arrival of the

steamer Oruga from Callao, on the 28th ult., we have further details of the disaster suffered on the coast from the earthquake and tidal waves. The destruction of property is estimated at \$20,000,000, and was confined mostly to the coast, although the town of Tarapaca, 23 leagues inland, and the villages of Pica, Matiffe and Conchance, far in the interior were more or less ruined. The shipping of guano from Southern deposits, will be indefinitely suspended, as all facilities in the way of launches, chutes, wharves, water condensers, and buildings of all kinds were swept away.
