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## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### WASHINGTON!

Dockery to Succeed Badeau.

The Syndicate and Secretary Sherman.

More Discontented Aspirants for Office.

Suicide Under Singular Circumstances.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—It is stated that there was an understanding that General Badeau should remain consul-general to England, and should only be continued in that office during the stay of General Grant in that country. General Dockery will probably succeed him.

The syndicate are pressing Secretary Sherman for some official expression, that the four per cent. shall bear gold interest. There is no probability that they will succeed, as Sherman is determined to take no action which Congress may reverse.

Aspirants for position abroad, are disappointed that the cabinet did not find time yesterday to decide their cases. The State department is courteous, but will promise nothing in any instance.

Robert Richter, a clerk in the War department, found his home pleasure in rearing tomatoes. His wife found her's in breeding cats. He molested the cats, and she tore up his tomato vines. Richter stationing himself in the midst of his demolished vines, said: "Now you see me," and shot off the top of his head. There are three little children and a frantic widow. Richter was a quiet, sober, industrious, and upright man.

A. V. Dockery, of N. C., has been appointed consul to Leeds. It is understood that when the consul-generalship becomes vacant, by the retirement of Gen. Badeau, Gen. Dockery will succeed, whereupon his son will resign the consulship at Leeds.

C. S. Winstead, collector of the Third district of North Carolina, has been requested to resign. His successor not yet named.

The Custom House Commission at New York will recommend the dismissal of 250 employees.

Gen. Noyes, now Minister to France, sails the 1st of July.

Turkey has given State deputies notice that they will respect the red crescent, as a protection to hospital trains. Turkey will indicate her hospital trains by a red crescent.

The President has commissioned Robt T Smith Collector of Customs for Mobile, and John Ferrenback Supervisor of Inspectors of steamboats for the 7th District, including Pittsburg, Wheeling and Cincinnati, and John Oglesby assistant appraiser of merchandise at New Orleans.

## MICHIGAN.

Views of Prominent Republicans Regarding President Hayes' Southern Policy.

DETROIT, June 16.—The Tribune published a number of letters from leading Republicans of the State, in response to the circular, asking their opinion upon the President's Southern policy. Seventeen of the letters cordially approve of that policy as the only wise and just course. All are in favor of standing by the party and the administration.

## DAKOTA TERRITORY.

Sitting Bull Will Stop Fighting.

BISMARCK, June 16.—A telegram says that Father Martin, of Standing Rock, has reached Bismarck on his return from a visit to Sitting Bull. He found him on Frenchman's Creek, 40 miles north of the British America boundary. After a long talk, Sitting Bull determined to quit fighting, and remain in the British possessions. All the British officers are willing to let him stay if he behaves himself.

## MISSOURI.

A Murderer and his Wife Commit Suicide.

St. Louis, June 16.—Geo. W. Groner, who murdered Alex. C. Starks, at Rockwell, Texas, in September, 1876, whose execution was to take place to-day, defrauded the gallows. For the past two days, Groner was allowed to have his wife with him. The sheriff entered the cell, and found Groner and his wife dead, having committed suicide.

## NEW YORK.

The Summer Regatta.

New York, June 16.—Senator Conkling sailed for Europe to-day, and a number of prominent Presbyterian clergymen, delegates to the council of Presbyterian Alliance at Edinburgh, also took their departure for Europe.

## THE EASTERN WAR

No European Power Should Possess Constantinople.

The Cross Danube.

Heavy Fighting Imminent.

Position of the Russian Staff.

Much Sickness in the Russian Camp.

LONDON, June 16.—It is reported that Gotschakoff, in reply to England, disowns any intention of occupying Constantinople, declaring that the city ought to belong to none of the European powers.

At the latest advices the Montenegrins had not been entirely driven from the Duga Pass. It is considered that the favorable progress of the war in Montenegro, will enable the Turks now fighting there to operate on the Russian right wing, when it crosses the Danube.

The Danube falls slowly. A dispatch from Shumla says an attempt to cross is hardly expected.

There is great excitement at Shumla and Rustchuk. Desperate fighting is shortly expected.

Vienna Press states that staffs of various Russian corps are now located at Bucharest, Kalarush, Semnitza, Turnu Magadi, Russioede, Alexandria, Rani and Guirgivo.

The News Galatz correspondent writes: "Rafts which the Russians have been constructing below Galatz, are ready for bridging purposes, and large numbers are being towed up to Ibrail. This quite supports the general opinion that the crossing will take place at Ghiacet, below Ibrail."

Sisters of mercy in large numbers who have recently arrived, are constantly visiting the camps and various hospitals, from which it is thought there are good many sick, though the Russians do their best to prevent the obtaining of information on that subject.

A Persian calling himself Baron Krant, a Hessian nobleman, was arrested as a Turkish spy some days ago at Ploesti, by the Russians. He has not been shot, as stated in a special dispatch from London. The second edition of the Telegraph says: "From the latest information it appears that the Russians have definitely determined to make the passage of the Danube between Ploesti and Turnu Magreti. Preparations indicate early operations."

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 16.—There is great irritation over affairs in Greece. Orders have been sent to Montenegro to hasten pacification.

Orders have been issued to send troops to Thessaly and Epirus.

PARIS, June 16.—The Russian telegraphic agency publishes the following: "Count Schouvaloff is to assure England that the route to India by way of the Suez Canal and the Russian Gulf, is free; that treaties will be observed, and that the question of the Bosphorus and Dardanelles will be settled at the end of the war by an European Congress. Beyond these points no engagement has been undertaken. The assertion that Russia will conform herself to the conclusions of peace to apply the resolutions adopted by the late conference, is, therefore, incorrect."

VERSAILLER, June 16.—In the Senate Duc De Broglie read President MacMahon's message, informing that body of his intention to dissolve the chamber of deputies, and demanding the concurrence of the Senate. After the reading the Senate decided to refer the question of dissolution to the bureau.

On the re-assembly of the deputies to-day, M. De Fourmont, member from the Interior, read the declaration announcing that President MacMahon had sent a message to the Senate, informing that body of his intention to dissolve the chamber by virtue of powers conferred upon him by the Constitution, and demanding the concurrence of the Senate.

BUCHAREST, June 16.—Milan is here. The Senate voted the ministerial bill for the immediate issue of six millions dollars in treasury notes. Railway works between Dredia and Ploesti was interrupted yesterday.
