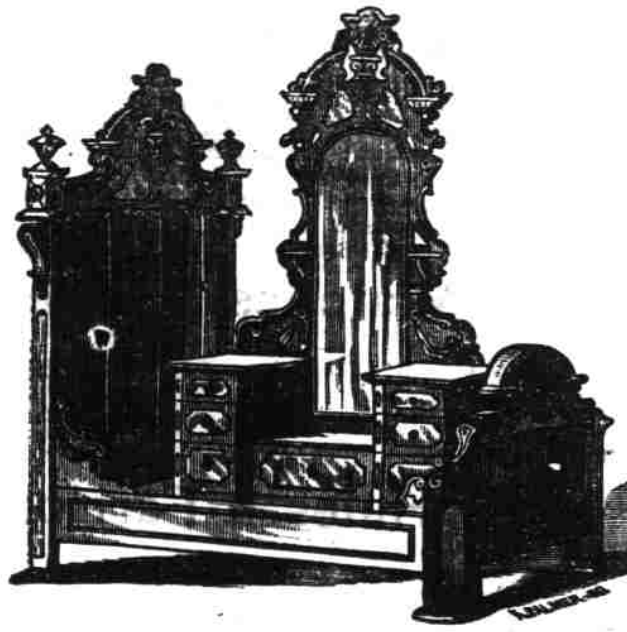

Gorman Bailed—Subscriptions to the Four Per Cent Bonds.

Good Civil Service Regulations—Going to Boston—A Surgeon Relieved—Payment of Interest—Sale of Gold—Appointment of Postmasters, Pension Agents, &c.

The Chief Justice Denies the Statement that He Received Only Tacitly in Charleston.

Wheat Prospects.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—General Gorman, arrested for libeling Hester, waived an examination and is held for the grand jury in one thousand dollars.

Reports made to the treasury show that up to the close of business yesterday the amount of four per cent. bonds subscribed for by the people of the United States, under the thirty days' limitation, is eight hundred thousand dollars, of which seven hundred thousand was subscribed at New York. It is estimated that the aggregate popular subscriptions will not exceed two millions of dollars.

Chief Justice Waite said to-night that during his stay in the city of Charleston, he was not conscious of any incivility on the part of the citizens of that place. He feels greatly mortified at the statements which have appeared in the newspapers in regard to their demeanor toward him while attending to his judicial duties in that circuit. His first knowledge of any such action on their part came to him through the President.

The June report of the Department of Agriculture, indicates a better prospect than usual for wheat. In the report of June, 1876, the average for the country was thirteen per centum below the standard of the normal condition, and the subsequent returns of the condition and yield were still lower, forecasting the scarcity which has occurred. The average for winter and spring wheat together, is this year one hundred—winter wheat being above that figure, and spring wheat, below it. There are two hundred and seventy-seven counties reporting winter wheat in full normal condition; four hundred and ninety-four above one hundred; and one hundred and eighty-three below it.

Of the spring wheat counties, ninety-two report one hundred, one hundred and seventeen above, and one hundred and thirty-seven below. The State averages are as follows: Maine, one hundred and one; New Hampshire, 102; Vermont, 102; Massachusetts, 100; Rhode Island, 100; Connecticut, 103; New York, 108; New Jersey, 100; Pennsylvania, 98; Delaware, 97; Maryland, 103; Virginia, 109; North Carolina, 100; South Carolina, 97; Georgia, 108; Florida, 100; Alabama, 90; Mississippi, 107; Louisiana, 103; Texas, 110; Arkansas, 100; Tennessee, 91; West Virginia, 107; Kentucky, 108; Ohio, 115; Michigan, 100; Indiana, 112; Illinois, 105; Wisconsin, 97; Minnesota, 95; Iowa, 102; Missouri, 110; Kansas, 99; Nebraska, 103; California, 40; Oregon, 109. Reports from California, indicate half of a full crop, from deficiency of winter rainfall. Fewer injuries from insects and rust are reported than usual. In the Ohio valley nearly every return is favorable. In Tennessee and Pennsylvania, the slight depreciation is caused by the Hessian fly.

The President to-day recognized W. L. Trenholm as vice consul of Russia, at Charleston, S. C., and D. K. Kieky at Pensacola.

Patterson has been commissioned as attorney of the Southern district of Florida.

The following dispatches were received at the Cabinet meeting to-day: "Chicago, June 20. 'Gen. E. P. Townsend, Washington, D. C.: 'The following dispatch from General Ord, dated Fort Clark, Texas, June 19, is respectfully forwarded: 'General Trevins, commanding here, and two of his staff, came over with me from Duncan. I gave a review, &c., and he went back yesterday. There is a good understanding between us on the bases of my instructions regarding prompt action to suppress marauding, and the co-operation of our troops on both sides of the river, in necessary pursuits. I think he is satisfied that nothing but good can possibly result. (Signed.) P. H. SHERIDAN, Lieutenant General.'"

The civil service regulations will probably be ready in a week. The President's idea is to forbid Federal officers from taking active parts in political manifestation being members of political conventions, or serving as members of political committees.

The President, Schurz, Ervarts and Devens, leave on Monday for Boston.

Assistant Surgeon Geo. H. Forney has been relieved from duty in the Department of the Gulf.

The payment of the July interest commences on the 23d inst, without rebate.

Callender Lewis has been appointed assistant paymaster of the navy. The treasury will sell a million of gold in New York on Thursday the 28th.

The President has appointed Fred. Kneples, pension agent at Indianapolis, vice Gen. Buck Terrell. Terrell was Morton's adjutant-general during the war.

The President has appointed J. C. Shaw, postmaster at Tarboro, N. C.; A. C. Newell, at Farmington, N. C.; M. K. Archer, at Gainesville, Ga.; R. P. Faddis, at Hempstead, Texas; W. D. Casey, at Gonzales, Texas; J. L. Thomas, collector of customs, at Baltimore, and Wm Cochran, naval officer; also decided that the pension agency for Illinois be located at Chicago, and Miss O. D. Sweet be retained as agent; also decided to retain the present agents at the various consolidated agencies, except in the case of Gen Terrell, whose commission is about to expire.

THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

English Officers Ordered to Resign.

Dalmatia to be Strengthened.

Russia Borrowing Money.

LONDON, June 22.—An Alexandria special says: The British government has ordered the English officers in the Khedive's service to resign.

The military council in Vienna have resolved to strengthen the force in Dalmatia by five thousand men.

The military correspondent at Bucharest telegraphs that all military attaches except the English, have gone to the front. The officers of the headquarters staff say that an English military attaché was so received by the Grand Duke as to render his remaining with the Russian army very uncertain. The barges used for transporting corn on the Danube, have been converted into floating blockhouses for the transferring of infantry. They are bullet proof.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 22.—An ukase is published authorizing the Minister of Finance to effect a 5 per cent loan of two hundred million roubles, to be called: "The Oriental loan of 1877." The loan is to be paid after forty-nine years.

Boston will Wine the President—The Women Protest Against It.

BOSTON, June 22.—A committee of ladies representing the women's temperance union waited on Mayor Prince to-day, with a petition that no intoxicating liquors be used at the banquet to be given in honor of President Hayes by the city of Boston. Mrs. Livermore heads the delegation. The mayor made an address, the substance of which was as follows: "I have been studying the subject for thirty years, and know that the desire of the prohibitionists cannot be accomplished for the reason that it is not right that it should be. I approve of the moderate use of wine and liquor, and as executive of the city of Boston, I have a duty to perform at the coming banquet and on similar occasions. The city of Boston desires that every courtesy shall be extended to the President, and I am determined that nothing shall be left undone which should contribute to the proper festivities of the banquet. It is customary on similar occasions to furnish wine, and I shall certainly do so in this instance."

THE NEW BRUNSWICK FIRE.

Tremendous Losses and Much Suffering.

BANGOR, MAINE, June 22.—The following dispatches have been received from the Carleton side of the river, dated at 4 o'clock this afternoon: "The fire is now under control. Every house south of King street, is burned. Fifteen thousand people are homeless. No household effects of any account were saved. About five hundred acres were burned over. Thirty bodies have been recovered, and as many more are missing."

FLASHES.

LONDON, June 22.—An explosion of the steamer Palestine from Boston, killed one person and precariously hurt two.

TROY, N. Y., June 22.—The moulder's union, one of the strongest in the country, resolved last night to allow its members to work in any shop on any terms—a virtual dissolution of the union. This action ends a strike of eight months duration.

BOSTON, June 22.—The loss in the St Johns fire is now estimated at \$15,000,000. Insurance \$6,000,000. The only American risks are in the Aetna, \$22,000; the Hartford, \$200,000; the Phoenix of Brooklyn, \$60,000.

THE WALLA WALLA MASSACRE.

Every White Man on the Salmon River Killed.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., June 22.—Advices from Walla Walla state that the Indians killed every man on the Salmon river, but spared the women and children. The Indians have got the best of the soldiers up to this time. They have killed about thirty and driven the others back from White Bird to Mount Idaho. The killed and wounded up to this time, is about fifty troops. It will take five hundred soldiers to whip Joseph's band.

James Gordon Bennett Returned—Hampton in Gotham.

NEW YORK, June 22.—James Gordon Bennett arrived to-day from Europe. Gov. Wade Hampton arrived here last night and went to a friend's house. To-morrow he will visit Wall street in relation to the new South Carolina loan. He expects to leave this city Saturday night.

Advance in Railroad Securities.

BALTIMORE, June 22.—Baltimore & Ohio shares sold this morning at 95 to 95, and at the close 95 was bid and 100 asked; Pittsburg & Connellsville and Marietta were also higher, the former selling at 100 to 100, and the latter at 100 for first, 43 for seconds, and 15 to 18 for thirds.

Enterprise at Fall River.

FALL RIVER, MASS., June 22.—The stockholders of the Wampanoag Mills, have ratified the decision of the directors to build mill No. 2, by a vote of 5 to 10, and also voted to increase the capital stock to one hundred thousand dollars. The Union Mills stockholders also held a meeting yesterday and voted to build mill No. 3.

The French Chamber to Adjourn Without Objection.

PARIS, June 22.—The Evening states that the Republican Senators have decided not to endeavor to prevent the dissolution of the Chamber by abstention.
