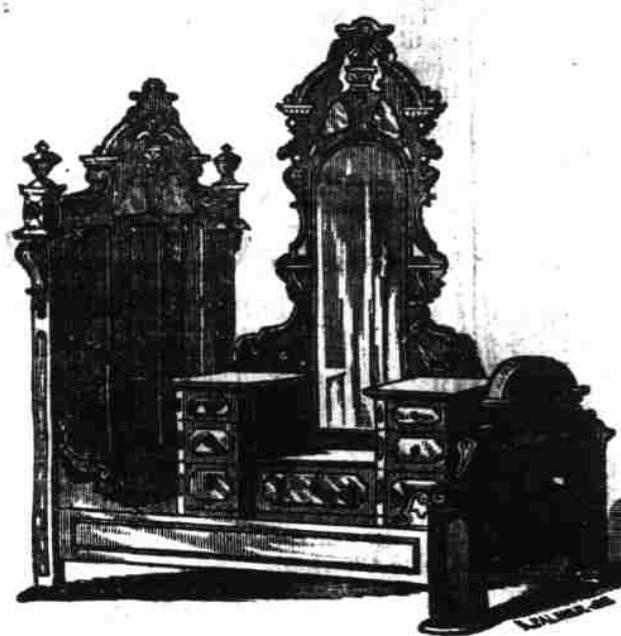

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON.

Discounted Pay Rolls. Continuation of the Franks Trial. Appointment of a Commissioner of Agriculture. Flipper Assigned to Duty.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Army officers can dispose of their pay rolls at twelve and a half per cent. off. Naval officers must submit to twenty per cent. discount.

The trial of Deputy Marshal Franks, of North Carolina, was resumed to-day. Several witnesses for the government, were examined, which showed that frauds were committed inside of Marshal Douglass's office by his deputies.

William G. Leduc, of Minnesota, but formerly of Ohio, was to-day appointed Commissioner of Agriculture, vice Watts, resigned. Leduc takes hold July 1st.

Cadet Henry O. Flipper, colored, has been assigned to the tenth regiment of cavalry, vice Fuller transferred.

PACKARD;

He Unburdens Himself in the Presence of Kindred Spirits.

DES MOINES, IOWA, June 27.—Gov. Packard, last night, in response to a serenade, spoke as follows:

"KIND FRIENDS: I am gratified at this exhibition of confidence and friendship to me. I represented the cause which you hold dear as Republicans and as American citizens, discharging as well as I could the simple duty that fell upon me as Governor of the State of Louisiana, trying to assert my authority and failing. I did not fail because the principles have failed, but I believe that the principles of the Republican party will yet save Louisiana to the Republican party."

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"In conclusion, hoping that we may have in future the same sterling, strong and resolute action as have always been had in this State, I predict that the other States will follow, and that this country will be saved to the Republican party for years to come. 'I thank you for your attention.'"

Why Decoration Day is Observed—Resolution of the Grand Army of the Republic.

PROVIDENCE, June 27.—The Grand Army of the Republic has adopted the following minute: "Inasmuch as there has been some difference of opinion as to the intent and meaning of Memorial Day, this encampment hereby resolves, That the Grand Army of the Republic seeks thus to preserve the memories of those who fought in defense of the national unity."

THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

Deserting Rutschuk.

Two Russian Army Corps in the Dobruzscha.

Russians Still Advancing.

The Roumanian Cabinet in Favor of the Army Crossing the Danube.

Russian Reinforcements—Continued Bombardment of Rutschuk and Slack in that of Kars.

Conflicting Accounts as to the Montenegrins.

RUSCHUK, June 25.—The population is flying into the neighboring villages. Twelve shells have fallen upon the military hospital, five upon the civil hospital and two upon the Orphan Asylum. The Turks in return have partly destroyed Guirgivo.

Two complete army corps, the 11th and 14th, are already in the Dobruzscha. At Rutschuk, the consulates of France, Italy, Greece, Germany and Belgium have been injured by the Russian fire.

LONDON, June 27.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Kustenje, dated last evening, says: "Tchernanoda and Medjic, have been evacuated, and telegraphic communication with Babadagh has been stopped. At 7 o'clock this morning the Cossacks were at Pappal, eight miles from Tchernanoda."

A Bucharest dispatch to the Times says: "The Roumanian Cabinet is in favor of the Roumanian army crossing the Danube, with the exception of M. Cogalniccano, Minister of Foreign Affairs, who strenuously opposes such a step."

LONDON, June 27.—The latest advices report that the Russian centre has been reinforced by the 20th division from Kars. Eighteen thousand men detached from the centre have advanced Savo Kamysh. The Turkish centre has also been reinforced by a division of 18 battalions, and has advanced two miles in front of Zurim, where the Ottoman headquarters still remain. The Turkish right is still reported to be pressing the Russian left.

Intelligence received at Erzeroum states that the Russian bombardment of Kars is slackening. In the Commons, Mr. Cewen, radical reformer, gave notice that he will tomorrow ask about the destruction of the Rutschuk consulate, and whether it is a breach of international law.

The Czar has ordered another army corps from the interior to the lower Danube.

A Rutschuk dispatch to the Times says: "The consuls here are drawing up a protest against the Russians bombarding their residences, as being against all principles of international law."

LONDON, June 27.—A dispatch to the Times from Cettinge, dated yesterday, says: "The Montenegrin army is concentrated in a very strong position opposite Spuz and Padgaritz. The morale seems to be good. The Prince is determined to fight for every foot of ground, should the Turks advance on Montenegrin territory."

The Times' Vienna correspondent says that accounts from Dalmatia represent that the position of the Montenegrins is quite desperate. Their forces are entirely broken and dispersed.

THE RED DEVILS.

Prospect of a General and Prolonged Indian War.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Father Mesplie, of Boise City, for 30 years a Catholic missionary among the Indian tribes, upon the point of peace quotes a principal chief, that the Indians laughed at General Howard and his fine speeches, saying that they would never persuade them to give up the Walla Walla valley, which they were resolved to keep at every hazard. Father Mesplie says the chiefs and principal men who inaugurated this war are rich and influential and they will be able to draw to their support all the disaffected Indians belonging to the various tribes, and that these constitute a majority in every case. He is of the opinion that the war will be general and prolonged.

Another Scattering of College Degrees.

BOSTON, Mass., June 27.—The following degrees were conferred by Harvard University to-day: A. M. upon Thos. Gold Appleton and Horace Howard Turrus; D. D. upon Rev. Phillips Brooks; L. D. upon Charles Devens, Thos. F. Bayard and Rutherford Birchard Hayes.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

ouldn't See it in That Light—A Resolution Approving the Action of the Administration Not Carried.

CONCORD, June 27.—In the House a resolution was introduced by Mr. Sinclair, Democrat, that the acts of the National Administration in the removal of United States troops and the restoration of State government in the States of Florida, Louisiana and South Carolina, and the order prohibiting officials from holding connection with what is known as the machinery of politics for the purpose of controlling political organization, and declaring that no assessment for political purposes on officers or subordinates should be allowed, to receive our unqualified approval, created a lively discussion, and finally, on motion of Stevens, Republican, was, by a strict party vote, referred to the committee on National Affairs.
