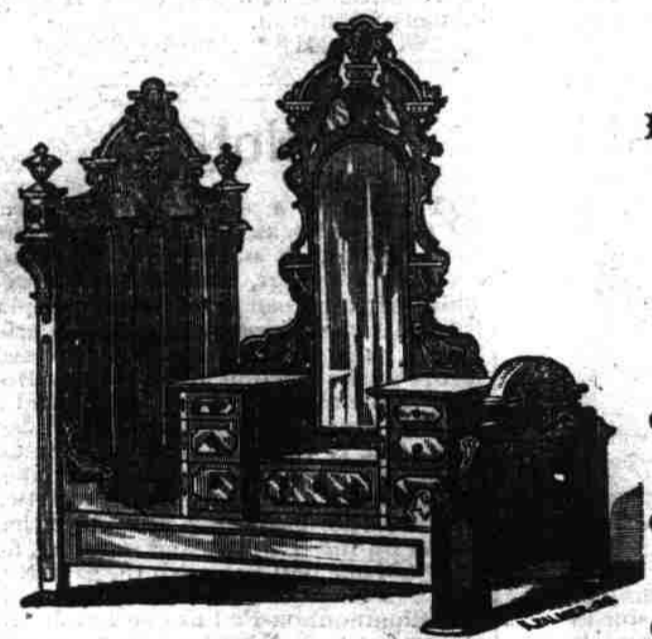

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Feeble Proceedings in the Franks Trial—Re-arrangement of the Treasury Districts—Other Notes and

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The Franks hearing has closed. The commissioner will decide on Monday whether to send him back to North Carolina for trial or discharge him.

Secretary Sherman has re-arranged the special treasury agent districts. The fifth includes Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia.

Governor McCormick, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, has returned.

The President's domestic establishment has been moved to the soldiers' home. He has the largest cottage on the grounds, that occupied by the late lamented Lincoln as a summer residence.

The subsidiary silver issued by the government to this date is over \$83,000,000. Five-eighths of a million of legal tenders have been destroyed during the month.

Advices have been received here by the respective bureaus that Charles, Collector of Internal Revenue, and Smith, postmaster, at Wilkesbarre, Pa., have resigned as chairman and secretary of the Republican county committee.

The State Department has assurances that Spain will make any amends proper when the alleged Ellen Ripah outrage is investigated.

The Indians Again on the War Path.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—A Portland Press dispatch, containing the latest reports from the scene of the Indian outbreak, says: "A tribe of Indians known as the River Snakes, killed John Ritchie, of Mount Idaho. The Occur d. Aledes, who have thus far strictly observed their promises of good behavior, are reported to be in pursuit of the murderers."

Shocking Homicide.

HARRISONBURG, W. VA., June 30.—A shocking homicide occurred at McGabeyville, Rockingham county, on last Thursday evening. Reuben Bonds, a farmer and blacksmith, and a former hotel keeper residing in that town, was killed by a stab from a pocket-knife in the hands of Zeblon D. Gilmer.

Long Branch Races.

LONG BRANCH, June 30.—In the mile heat, Yorkshire Lass won; Egypt, second; King Bee, third; time 1:46. In the mile and a half heat Baden-Baden won; Basil, second; Rife, third; time 2:40.

THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

Why the Loss was so Small—Fears of Famine in Bulgaria.

Bombardment Along the Danube—Accretions for Servia—Successful Attempt to Unmask the Turkish Batteries.

Ineffectual Attempt to Cross at Nickopolis.

BUCHAREST, June 29.—The Russian forces at Herzova reported to be marching on Silistria are said to be within forty kilometres of that fortress. The Turks are apparently concentrating their troops in the principal forts where they will soon be attacked.

The Russians have also crossed at Tarnu Magureli, and have joined Grand Duke Nicholas at Siatova.

LONDON, June 30.—Telegrams to the Daily News from various points on the Danube give the particulars of a frightful bombardment along that river.

ATMINTON, General Ehrenworth of the eleventh infantry division was shot through the shoulder by the Turkish sharpshooters from the other side of the Danube.

The Daily News' dispatch from Vienna, dated last night, says: "It is persistently announced here that a battle has been raging to-day below Siatova."

LONDON, June 30.—There are rumors that the Russians have captured Batoun.

A Turkish gunboat has destroyed the bridge at Ibrail. The foreign consuls have left Rutchuk.

A dispatch from Nikopolis to the Daily Telegraph, dated June 29th, says: "The Russians attempted to cross the river here on Thursday in fifty lighters. Ten of the lighters were sunk by shells, and the attempt failed. The slaughter was frightful."

Capt. Eads' Report.

ST. LOUIS, June 30.—Captain Eads has made a highly satisfactory report to the South Pass Jetty Company. After narrating the successful results in six essential respects, the report concludes: "7th. Finally, I may add with absolute certainty, that this entire system of works is now so far completed that no financial difficulties can intervene to arrest the processes of nature, which are constantly operating to enlarge and perfect the desired channel through them."

An Incendiary Fire and Loss of Life.

WATERTOWN, N. Y., June 30.—An incendiary tramp burned a farm house in this vicinity to-day. The inmates, except an eight-year old girl escaped. The mother, with a child, ran through the flames, covered with a blanket. Two small boys jumped from a window.
