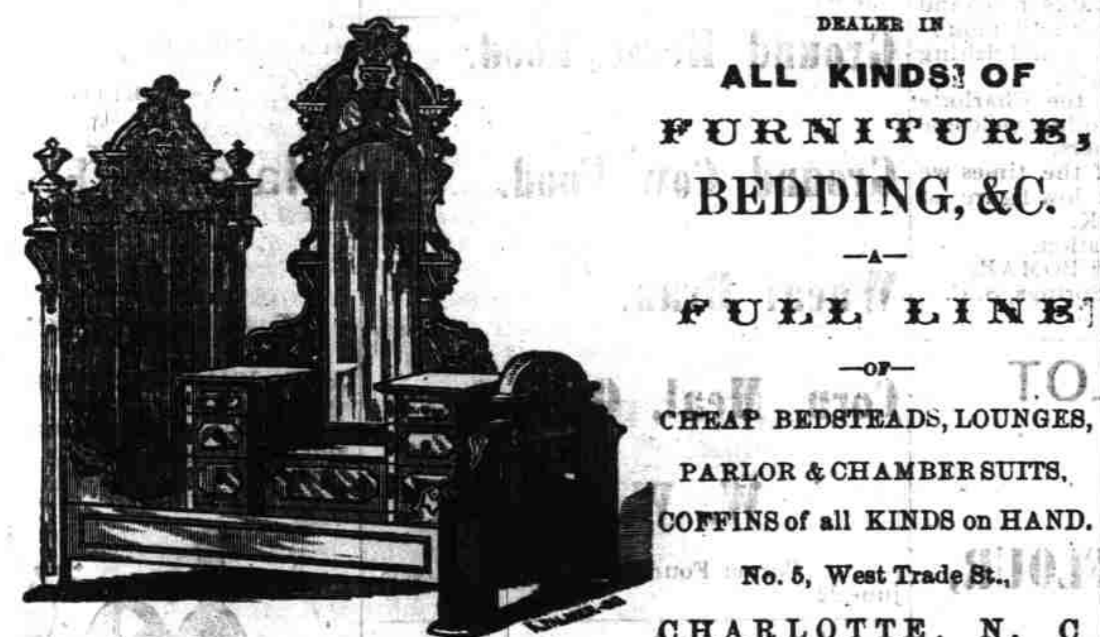

WASHINGTON.

The United States and Mexico—The Agricultural Bureau—Rumors of a Disintegration of the Cabinet—Hayes the Defender of Wells and Anderson.

Other Washington Notes.

Washington, D. C., July 3, 1877.

It is claimed in high circles that the speeches during the President's visit to Boston were composed with a view of excluding political, or other significance.

Commissioner LeDuc has taken possession of the Agricultural Department. The cotton interest will be glad to hear that Mr. Dodge, the statistician, continues in charge of the statistical bureau of the department.

The instructions issued to General Trevine, commanding on the Rio Grande, in connection with the orders issued to Gen. Ord, authorizing him to follow the Mexican marauders across the river, are positive. Gen. Trevine is instructed to resist such invasion, but the Mexican war department takes care to explain that such resistance could not be considered an act of war against the United States.

Trevine is instructed to send a Commissioner to Gen. Ord, to explain these views, and to assure him of the willingness on the part of Mexico of observing the extradition treaty between the United States and Mexico, but, at the same time, the determination to maintain all her rights under the laws of nations. The order also states that Gen. Mata is fully empowered to treat on these subjects at Washington.

A Herald special reports a disintegration of the Cabinet. There are rumors that Key fads he can relieve the President by resigning, and McCrary, in view of the expression of his Iowa constituents, is bound to resign.

The President is irritated over the indictment of Wells and Anderson for perjury, in connection with the Louisiana Returning Board. The President's idea was that all matters of this character were condoned by the Matthews-Foster bargain.

The Agricultural Commissioner, Watts, after consultation with Secretary Cameron, declines the invitation to resign, and his suspension also comes before the Senate. There will be muddy water after about the fifteenth of October.

The treasury on Thursday will probably sell ten million bonds.

Col French of the second artillery, has been promoted, vice Gen Roberts, retired.

Nothing was done in the Cabinet in regard to foreign appointments.

Sherman and McCrary are absent.

Everts returned early this morning. The weather is very threatening.

Secretary Everts submitted to the Cabinet to-day Diaz's order to General Trevine, ordering him to resist with force the invasion of Mexico by the United States troops, as authorized by instructions to Gen Ord. The Mexican order was discussed but no action was taken. Gen Mata has not yet had an interview with Everts concerning his recognition as minister of Diaz's government. He may be received by Everts Thursday. There is no indication that Mata will be received as Mexican minister, or that the instructions to Ord will be modified. The administration will act slowly, and cautiously in receiving a new minister from Mexico.

The President has commissioned the following postmasters: Shuford, Minnola, Texas; Chamberlin, Belton, Texas; Wilson, Lynchburg, Va.

Gov McCormick represented at the treasury in the Cabinet to-day.

The Secretary of the Navy has issued an order declaring ten hours a legal day's work, but contracts for greater or lesser times are legal.

A Terrific Storm in Ohio and Indiana.

CINCINNATI, O., July 3, 1877.

Another heavy storm swept through northern and central Ohio and Indiana last evening and this morning. Last evening at Elkhart, Ind., six houses were levelled and four others partly destroyed. Mr. Walters was blown out of his house, his head and back being dangerously cut. Jas. Bowen was caught under a falling house and severely injured. Mrs. Bowen was terribly bruised, and five others were seriously injured at Kingsbury. Near Laporte, Ind., the wind demolished the residence of Mr. Barney, killing four persons. Mr. Fletcher, of Clinton, Elkhart county, was killed by a falling roof. His daughter was badly injured. Three men near Waterloo were struck by lightning and one of them instantly killed.

Dexter Park Races.
