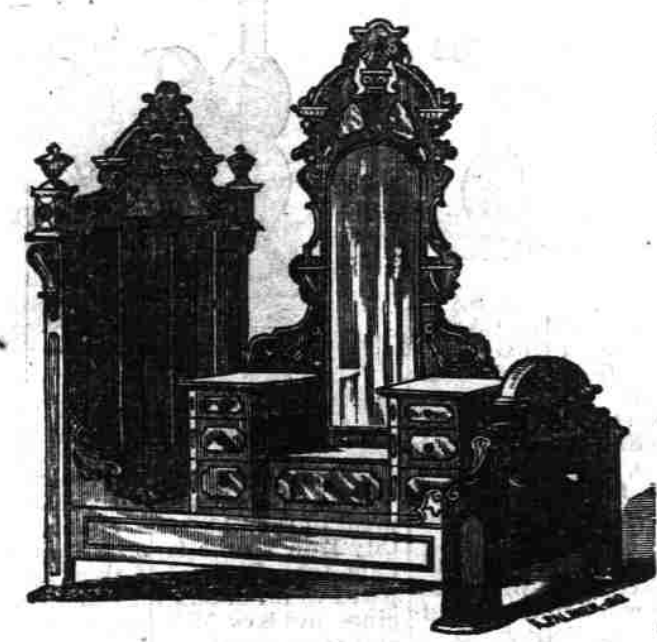

WASHINGTON.

Contest Over the Southern Mail.

Marshal Douglass Not to be Arrested - Stanley Matthews Never Made a Contract About Louisiana

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The action with regard to the special treasury agents, Brockett and Moore is the sensation of the day.

The Atlantic Coast Line via Wilmington, the Piedmont Air Line via Richmond and Charlotte, and the Kennebec via Lynchburg, Knoxville and Atlanta, are making a desperate fight for the great Southern mail.

Senor Mata called at the State Department to-day to inquire whether an answer to his note inclosing his credentials would reach him in time for this week's mail to Mexico.

Advices received at the Interior Department from San Diego foreshadow an outbreak in that quarter among the Mission Indians.

The Department of Justice disavows any intention of arresting Marshal Douglass of North Carolina.

Hon. Stanley Matthews of Ohio, has authorized an interviewer to say that he has never made any bargain with any body about anything at any time connected with the Louisiana affairs, and that all assertions to the contrary are pure invention.

John De B. Hooper has been appointed postmaster at Opelika, Alabama.

The Closing of the Hebrew Council—Election of Officers.

PHILADELPHIA, July 12.—The closing scene of the council of the union of the Hebrew congregations opened this morning with a prayer by Rev. Dr. Lilienthal, of Cincinnati.

The Republican Party Abandoned in Mississippi.

NEW YORK, July 12.—Private advices from Jackson, Mississippi, state that the Republican committee of that State met on Saturday and passed by a men's majority resolution of confidence in President Hayes.

Probable Resignation of the Earl of Beaconsfield.

LONDON, July 12.—The Daily News publishes the following paragraph in a prominent form: "Yesterday rumors prevailed in quarters usually well informed, that the Earl of Beaconsfield is about to resign the Premiership.

Equalizing Freights—Meeting of Railroad Men.

NEW YORK, July 12.—A large meeting of railroad officials interested in the Texas business, held at St. Louis yesterday for the purpose of equalizing rates to points in that State, principally on stock in car loads, agreed to reduce rates to several points, so as to make rates equal to the distance, and to prevent the centering of all traffic at one point.

Muzzling the Press.

NEW YORK, July 12.—The French government has forbidden the circulation in France of the Courier des Etats Unis of this city, on account of several articles which have appeared in it lately denouncing MacMahon's course.

THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

WASHINGTON.

Czarowitch to Lead the "Army of Rostchuk."

The Withdrawal of Russians From Turkish Armenia.

The Russians Repulsed Before Rostchuk.

LONDON, July 12.—The Daily News special from Biele, July 8th, confirms the report that the twelfth and thirteenth army corps have been constituted the army of Rostchuk, and are destined for the siege of that fortress, with the Czarowitch as commander in chief.

The St Petersburg correspondent reports that the Czar has ordered the withdrawal of the Russians from Turkish Armenia. Great despatches are received among the troops in consequence.

The Turkish forces are concentrated on the line between Rasgrade, Shumla, Ezki and Djuma.

The Russians were last heard from at Monastir, on the road to Rostchuk, which is separated from the Turkish position by the river Lemi, the banks of which being precipitous and abundant in good positions, may therefore become the scene of the first serious engagement in Bulgaria.

The Times' Berlin correspondent says: "The Austrian government has ascertained that Serbia and Roumania have concluded a treaty with a view to joint operations against the Turks, and have authorized Hungarian tax department to keep funds ready for the mobilization of the militia."

A special dispatch from Rostchuk to the Daily News says: "Several Bulgarians have been arrested, charged with assisting the Russians and fomenting insurrections, and also with distributing petroleum to fire the town."

The Daily News' Yarna correspondent writing under the date of June 28th, says that up to that date in Rostchuk, seven hundred persons were killed and wounded by the bombardment.

BATTLE OF BOYAE.

MONTREAL, July 12—12 30 P. M.—All is peace so far, but immense crowds of ominous import are gathering in St James street, Victoria square and Craig street. The members of the Catholic union have their rendezvous at St Patrick Hall.
