

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

The Withdrawal of Russians From Turkish Armenia.

The Russians Repulsed Before Rustchak.

London, July 12.—The Daily News' special from Biela, July 8th, confirms the report that the twelfth and thirteenth army corps have been consti-tuted the army of Rustchuk, and are

writing under the date of June 28th, says that up to that date in Rustchuk, seven hundred persons were killed and wounded by the bombardment. The Daily Telegraph's Adrianople dispatch says that the Russian cavalry are at the Chipka Pass.
