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

THE INDIAN WAR.

Stanford, Conn., July 14.—The attempt to reorganize the Charter Oak Life Insurance Company, by putting its affairs into the hands of new and trustworthy officers, has failed, the assets not warranting the undertaking in the opinion of the gentlemen who were requested to take hold of the company. 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THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

The Russians Attacked Simultaneously at Two Places.

London, July 14 —The Times' Bucha-rest correspondent says that it is official ly reported that Rustchuk is blockaded by the Russians.

The Czar has arrived at Fratesh, a station on the Bucharest and Guirgevo

station on the Bucharest and Guirgevo Railroad, where, according to some accounts, he is to take up his residence. The advance guard of another Russian corps has arrived at Ploresti.

It is reported that a camp for 80,000 men is prepared at Ploresti.

A battle is expected at Ezki Djumandja, where the Turks are concentrated in great force.

The Times' correspondent at Cettenje telegraphs: "Several accounts agree that the destination of Sulieman Pasha's army is Adrianople."

The Daily Telegraph's Pera correspondent sends the following, dated Friday evening: "I have just heard on good authority that the Russians have been attacked simultaneously by Osman Pasha at Pliena, and by Ahmed Eyoub Pasha at Monastu.
