

J M Pinkney, one span and three carriages \$5,000; S C Evans, one span and carriage, \$3,000; Mrs James Harper, one span and carriage, \$1,500; Wm Bird, one span and carriage, \$3,000; Matthew Leary, one span and two carriages, \$5,000; Wm Lattimer, one span and carriage, \$1,000; J H Bonnel, one horse and buggy, \$500; C F Timpson, one horse and phæton, \$800; John Abindrath, one horse and buggy, \$400; J K Bangs, one saddle horse, \$300; G H Whithauss, one horse and phæton, \$500.
