

Sugar Refining---An Important Decision Concerning the Payment of Brawbacks-The Secretary of the Treasury May Set Aside the Action of the Southern Claims Commission.

Washington, August 25 .- Schurz is still unable to find a commissioner willing to visit Sitting Bull at his own

Secretary Sherman is expected today. He will immediately decide what drawback shall be allowed on import-ed sugars. It is agreed by all members of several commissions that the draw-backs heretofore allowed are excessive, and in many instances double the duty is paid on the sugars maintained at the Treasury Department; that drawbacks now allowed are so much money clear to the refiners of sugars. The refiners claim that if the Secretary of the Treasury reduces the amount of drawbacks many refineries will be compelled to close doors, and that refining cannot

be carried on except at a great less. WASHINGTON, D. C, August 25.—The New York Times has a Washington special which says: "Solicitor Robinson, of the Treasury Department, gave an opinion of importance, to the effect that the Secretary of the Treasury is justified in setting aside a fraudulent claim against the government, although the claim has been allowed by the Southern claims commission, and money for its payment appropriated by Congress. The opinion was written in reference to claims of Caleb Tompkins, of Georgia, for damages growing out of the war. The Southern commission allowed it-reported it to Congress according to law, and money was appropriated for its payment, but evidence has recently come to the Treasury Department to show that it is fraudulent. Although there is no law authorizing the Secretary to refuse to pay claims of this character, still, in the light of the evidence before him, which was discovered subsequent to the decision of the Southern claims commission, Solicitor Robinson is of the opinion that the Secretary can legally postpone its payment, until he can have the matter reported to Congress, and that body repeal the bill, authorizing the payment of the claim.

Vessel Containing Cholera not Allowed to Enter Suez-Servia's Plan of Action-The Battle of Eski Djuma.
