

### Another Bank Insolveut.

Bosron, September 1.—On ascertaining that the July dividend had been passed by the Sandwich Savings bank, the bank commissioner found that the bank was insolvent, and obtained an injunction restraining them from transacting any further business. The total amount of deposits in the bank is \$1,100,000. The present difficulty is due to the shrinkage in the value of property in Boston and other places, on which mortgages to the amount of \$400,000 are held. The exact condition of the bank cannot be ascertained.

The Effux of Gold for New New York.

LONDON, September 1.—The Standard, in its financial article, says with respect to the effux of gold for New York, which was thought probable: "We learn that there are no orders in the market for that quantity, and it is believed that the exchange between New York and this country will be balanced by an export of bonds, without the necessity of demanding gold."

### A Half Million Fire.

St. Louis, September 1.—A special from Paris, Missouri, reports a half million fire. Ten business blocks, including three hotels, telegraph office and an express office, cc. It was an incendiary work. The fire originated in a saloon, where a man by the name of Tyler poured oil on the floor, saying that he would "burn the damned town"

#### RUSSIA AND TURKEY,

The Week Closes Favorable for the Turks.

Further Particulars of Thursday's Battle-The Fight Gradally Developing into Operations on a Large Scale.

The Bulletin says: "Prince Charles of Roumania assumes command of the united Russian and Roumanian forces

united Russian and Reumanian forces composing the western detachment. Grand Duke Nicholas, however, appoints the chief of the staff to the Roumanian Prince. Four newly formed Russian divisions will defend the Black Sea coast, replacing the seventh and tenth army corps, hurrying them here to the Danube."

A correspondent of the Times reports Thursday's battle: Three Turkish brigades, two batteries and two squadrons of cavalry advanced from near Rasgrad. Mehemit Ali and Prince Hassan took position on the high hill commanding an uninterrupted view from Rasgrad beyond Osman Bazar. The Egyptians participated in this battle. The battle field extended fifteen miles. The Russians gradually gave way, and by 5 o'cleck were scampering after them in fine style.

A special from Bucharest, says: "General Tolier, the great Russian engineer who planned the defences of Sebastopol, has arrived here."

The later editions of the Daily News and Standard publish dispatches from their correspondents who were eye witnesses of Thursday's battle, which confirm in detail the serious Russian defeat on the Lom. Bo.h correspondents agree that Popke has been abandoned, and the Russian position completely turned. The Turks are continuing the pursuit. Baker Pasha, under whom the Turkish cavalry charge was made, and who had two horses shot, is with Capt Briscoe, one of his staff, reported missing.

The week closes favorably for the Turks throughout the whole theatre of war. As regards Schipka, although Sulieman Pasha has not succeeded in drawing out the garrison, he has almost completely blockaded it. The latest Russian bulletin almost admits that he is master of the situation "for the time," as it says: "The Russians are ignorant whether he is about to retire or renew the assault, or attempt a turning movement. It is therefore apparent that he has his choice of action, and from the fact that he has pushed a reconnoisance to Kickilagatock which is in the northern slope of the Balkans, he seems to have chosen a turning movement. The reconnoisance was probably only made by a small body. The Russian position in the pass, block the only road through it which is practicable for the heavy material of the main army. Mehemit Ali's advance from the eastward possesses great importance in view of the fact that the Russian position at Tirnova, which is supposed to be the object of Turkish movement, is comparatively open to an attack from the east by a road leading from Bebrouva and Elena, which debauches into the Tirnova and Drenovs, and ten miles south of Tirnova, whereas Sulieman Pasha, even if he finally cleared Schipka, would vance in the direction of Tirnova, it seems that he would have to clear the Russians from their position at Pakei-Papaskei, from which they could threaten his flank.
