

A petition against the repeal of the bankrupt law and for amendments to it has been circulated in New York for a few days past, and has received great many signatures from the larger merchants and bankers.

The Louisville Courier Journal says the national grange at its meeting next month will represent about 9,000 subordinate granges, with a paying membership of something near 400,000, against 700,000 in 1876.

The Permanent Exhibition has proved anything but a success. A Philadelphia exchange says the "exhibitors are despondent, have all lost money, and a large number of them have expressed an intention of removing their exhibits before the commencement of the winter."
