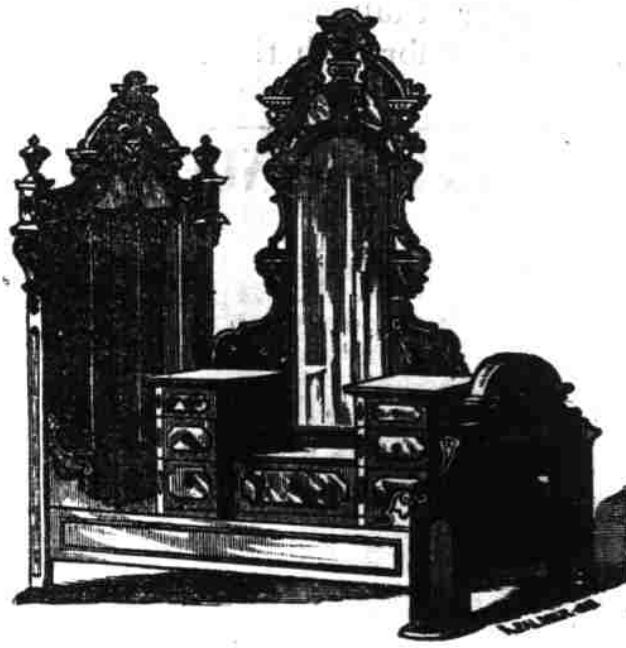

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON.

The President's Departure for Richmond—Shipments of Silver in the Ports of Mexico.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS. Efforts to Change the Date of the Meeting of the Next Regular Session—Nominations.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—A special cabinet meeting was held to-day. The President will leave on a special car for Richmond early to-morrow.

An effort will be made to-day to secure an adjournment before the November election. Should it fail, the prospects are unfavorable for legislation until after that event.

Information has been received from Mexico to the effect that, taking into consideration the necessity which exists of giving an impulse to the export of agricultural and industrial products,

The President has ordered that it be permitted to foreign steam and sail vessels to carry gold and silver coins from one port of the republic to another, so there may be no want of hard cash on board the same.

To prevent the realization of mercantile transactions relative to the exportation of national products, and to avoid the abuses which may be attempted, the custom houses, on issuing the corresponding permits and extending the respective passes, of which the return pass shall be presented, shall require a bond to their satisfaction from whomsoever it may belong, that he may prove within a prudent period indicated, that the amount remitted was destined to the object for which it was sent, with the understanding that the want of this proof in its due time, will alone be a sufficient cause for proceeding immediately to require the payment of the duties pertaining to the amount sent.

SENATE—Ingalls, of Kansas, introduced a bill to fix the date of the meeting of the first regular session of the Forty Fifth Congress upon the first Monday of November. Referred to the committee on Privileges and Elections.

Nominations: New York custom house, as telegraphed; Smith, collector of customs at Mobile; Oglesby, Lewis and McMillan, for their respective offices in New Orleans; Wilson, James and Forbes, for Virginia postmasters; A. W. Houghton, minister to Russia; Jno. Baxter, of Tenn, Judge of Sixth District; Parsons, District Attorney of Alabama; Wm. H. Smith, Collector of Customs at Chicago; Jos. D. Brady, Collector of the Second District of Virginia; Fitzsimmons, Marshal of Georgia; Wells, Consul Gen'l to China; Walden, Marshal of West Tennessee.

Many bills have been introduced which will delay the announcement of the committees to a late hour in the afternoon.

A hasty glance discovers no other important Southern or general nominations.

The committee on Privileges and Elections met, but adjourned, the matter not having been printed.

HOUSE—The call of States for bills for reference occupied the House for five hours, and the consequence was the introduction of the largest number of bills that were ever presented in one day in the history of Congress. They reached eight hundred and forty-five. They might be classified into some half a dozen prominent subjects: The repeal of the resumption act; the re-coinage of silver; the repeal of the bankrupt law; the abolition of the tax on tobacco by producers; the extension of the pension laws of the South; the repeal of the test oath, and appropriations for works of internal improvements. Among the latter were bills appropriating three millions for the Mississippi levees, and one million for the Missouri river. The committees were announced. Wood, of New York, is chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, and Atkins, of Tennessee, is chairman of the committee on Appropriations. Adjourned to Wednesday.

The President leaves at 10 o'clock to-morrow. Everts, Schurz, Devens and Sherman swell the President's train.

FRANCE.

The Results of the Second Ballot on Sunday.

PARIS, October 29.—The results of the second ballots, yesterday, so far as known, show nine government candidates, and two Republicans elected.

In three arrondissements the Republican candidates claiming they were elected on the 19th inst., did not stand, intending to submit their claim to the Chamber of Deputies. The Republicans, however, did not attach much importance to these supplemental elections, because, excluding three Unionist arrondissements, the above mentioned ten second ballots were rendered necessary, simply by the division of the conservative vote between the opposing Royalist and Bonapartist candidates, one of whom was withdrawn, rendering the result certain.

Completed Espenilles, (Bonapartist), defeated M. Gerdin, a Moderate Republican, and a member of the last Chamber for the Chateau Chignon department of Nieyre, whose candidature Gambetta went to Chateau Chignon to support.

PARIS, October 29.—The *Soliel* again to-day insists that President MacMahon, or the ministry must resign. There is no other way out of the crisis. *Le Soliel* says, and it naturally prefers that the ministry should resign.

A conservative paper, *Le Assemble Nationale*, declares it can confirm the statement of the *Pays*, that the resignation of the ministry has already been determined upon in principle.

LONDON, October 29.—Later intelligence from Paris shows that fifteen second ballots were held yesterday, resulting in the election of eleven Conservatives and four Republicans.

By this result the Chamber will stand, 320 Republicans, and 210 Conservatives.

[NOTE.—The results of yesterday's balloting reported in this dispatch do not admit the claim of three Republicans that they were elected on the 14th inst., as mentioned in a previous dispatch.]

THE WAR.

A Siege Against Silistria—A Pole Chief of Juleiman's Staff—No News From Kurs.

LONDON, October 29.—Zimmerman, commanding the army of the Dobrudzha, is bringing heavy siege guns against Silistria.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 29.—Bielowski, a Pole, known in the Turkish army as Gen. Nihad, has been appointed Suleiman Pasha's chief-of-staff, and went to Mina Abelan to command the cavalry division at Rasgrad.

LONDON, October 29.—A Reuter from Bucharest, dated to-day, says: "Yesterday, a body of Russians carried the Turkish position at Telischoe, west of Elyena. One Pasha with several officers and some companies of Turkish troops was taken prisoner. Three cannons were captured."

ST. PETERSBURG, October 29.—A special dispatch to the *Gazette*, dated October 27, gives no later information about Kurs than when that place was completely invested. The dispatch says Gen. Terghasoff has occupied Bayzaid.

ENGLAND.

The Cleopatra Obelisk—The Colliery Explosion.

LONDON, October 29.—It is said that the obelisk ship, "Cleopatra," the caisson containing the Egyptian obelisk, will remain at Ferrol all winter, pending the determination of the question of salvage in the admiralty court, the owners of the steamer "Fitz Maurice" which recovered the caisson after it was abandoned in the gale by the steamer Olga and towed it into Ferrol having refused the contractors' offer for that service.

Two hundred and fifty persons perished in the High Blantyne colliery explosion.

Joseph Durham, the sculptor, is dead.

Gen Forrest Dying.

MEMPHIS, October 29.—Gen Forrest was unconscious during the afternoon. It is thought that he is dying.

AUGUSTA.

Violent Death—Fire—Railroad Conductors' Life Association.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Oct. 29.—Winchester Graeson, clerk in the Comptroller's Office at Columbia, S. C., jumped from the rear platform of a railroad car, two miles from Augusta, and was killed.

A fire this morning destroyed a large tenement house and impaired other property. Loss, \$12,000.

The members of the Railroad Conductors' Life Insurance Association, numbering about 150, spent Sunday in Augusta, and left for Charleston.

Yellow Fever—An Appeal in Behalf of the Fernandina Sufferers.

NEW YORK, October 29.—Mayor Ely, to-day, received an appeal for aid from the mayor of Fernandina, Florida.

The appeal says eight hundred families have to be supported before business can be resumed. They had on hand \$800, and required \$7,000 to keep all from starving and supply the sick with necessaries.

A Royal Marriage.

LONDON, October 29.—The reported marriage of King Alfonso, of Spain, to Princess Mercedes, daughter of the Duke de Montpensier, has been fixed for the 23rd of January next.

Morton's Condition.

INDIANAPOLIS, October 29.—Senator Morton's condition at 1 o'clock this afternoon, was about the same as reported last night. The stomach refuses to retain nourishment.
