

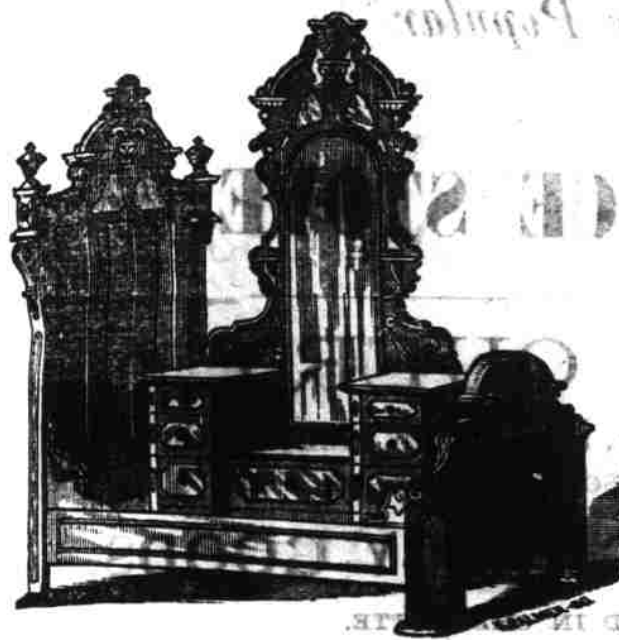

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

The Silver Bill before the Senate - The Deficiency Bill - An Increase in the Receipts from Internal Revenue.

Senator Patterson's Habeas Corpus Case - Senator M C Butler.

General News and Gossip.

WASHINGTON, Nov 21.-Col Wicker, collector of customs at Key West, has left for his post.

SENATE - Several private bills were considered, and at 12:20 Conkling submitted a motion to adjourn, but at the suggestion of Mr Hamilton he withdrew it, and on the motion of the last-named gentleman, the Senate went into executive session.

The Finance committee finished the silver bill and will report it this afternoon. It is as it came from the House except that the government shall coin not less than two, nor more than four, millions of silver dollars per month.

HOUSE - The deficiency appropriation bill is under discussion.

NIGHT DISPATCHES.

HOUSE - The House occupied all day considering the deficiency bill, which appropriates about \$1,500,000.

On motion of Waddell, of North Carolina, an amendment was adopted rendering available for the star service of the postoffice (carrying the mails on other than railroad and steamboat routes) \$700,000, heretofore appropriated, but not expended.

The Senate remained in executive session over an hour, and succeeded in confirming only Wm J Hunter, receiver of public monies at Hayes City, Kansas.

The President signed the army bill and the navy deficiency bill.

The secrecy has been removed from the executive session proceedings of the Senate regarding Santo Domingo. It is unknown whether this action is intended to unearth or bury scandal.

The report of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shows an increase of \$1,000,000 in the receipts from distilled spirits. Total increase of internal revenue from all sources \$1,750,000.

The product of tobacco and the revenue therefrom is largely increased, more especially in cigarettes.

The habeas corpus case of Senator Patterson was resumed today and the argument commenced. It promises to occupy several days.

In the Senate this afternoon Mr Conkling, for the Republican Senators demanded an immediate vote on the motion of Mr Hoar to lay on the table the resolution of Mr Thurman to discharge the committee on Privileges and Elections from the further consideration of the credentials of M C Butler as Senator from South Carolina.

The Democratic Senators approved this motion, and to carry the matter over until to-morrow Mr Thurman submitted another for an executive session, which was agreed to.

SENATE - The silver bill was reported to-day. After the executive session the committee on Privileges and Elections from the further consideration of the Senatorial contest from South Carolina, was discussed to adjournment.

The House Elections committee appointed a sub-committee, consisting of Turney, Cobb and Thornburg, on the Florida contest of Finley vs Bisbee.

The House today did not contain the item to defray the expenses of the President's Louisiana commission.

There was such an item in the bill as originally reported from the committee on Appropriations, but subsequently that bill was withdrawn and re-committed, and as reported back it omitted all reference to the Louisiana commission.

It is surmised that this change of mind on the part of the committee was caused by a desire to avoid a text for a political discussion that might be both dilatory and excited.

THE WAR.

The Possibility of the Fall of Erzeroum.

LONDON, November 21.-The Times' Erzeroum correspondent in a letter dated October 25th, says: "If winter breaks upon us shortly and Kars holds out, we may keep Erzeroum, but if the weather continues fine, and Kars falls, this place cannot repel the Russians."

The Manchester Guardian's Pera correspondent telegraphs as follows: "We have just heard of the capture of Kars. The fall of Erzeroum is expected to follow. The Porte now appears desirous of entertaining peace proposals. Server Pasha, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Mahmud Damad are said to be more favorable to peace."

A special to the Standard from Venran Kaleh contains the following: "Seventeen thousand men from the Kars army will be detached to assist at the siege of Plevna."

English Finances.

LONDON, Nov 21.-The Times' financial column says that in consequence of a low rate of discount at Paris, business may now be expected to be diverted thither, and rates here will be correspondingly weaker, though no reduction of the Bank of England rate of five per cent is anticipated until its reserve is materially strengthened.

FRANCE.

The Attitude of the Chamber of Deputies - The Electoral Committee - The Constitution of the Council of War.

VERSAILLES, November 21.-The Deputies, by a vote of 297 to 210, passed the motion introduced by M Benoit to the effect that in view of the doctrine enunciated by Duval de Broglie, yesterday, the Chamber being resolved to maintain its prerogatives against encroachments, adjourns the discussion on the validity of the election of M Reille, under secretary of State at the ministry of interior, until the electoral abuses committee shall have reported on his doings relative to official candidatures.

M Marcon then urged that as the ministry had resigned and no regular government was expressed, the Chamber ought to adjourn.

The Chamber, notwithstanding the protests of the Right, agreed by 233 to 231 to adjourn until Thursday.

In the Bureau, M Gambetta being asked whether the Left would vote direct taxes, replied at once that that depended on circumstances.

The Bureau have elected the budget committee. All its members belong to the Left. The attitude of the Chamber of Deputies has created a deep impression everywhere.

The Senate to-day adjourned until Thursday.

The France publishes a circular of the ministers of finance and commerce, enjoining their subordinates to avoid the electoral abuses committee neither directly nor indirectly.

LONDON, November 21.-A Reuter's Paris dispatch says the new ministry will not be gazetted before Thursday. It is expected that Gen Grimaudet de Rochaubert will be president of the council, and minister of war; M Battille, minister of instruction; M Fouyer, minister of finance; M Denjoy, Justice; Dewolche, of the interior; M Boneville, of foreign affairs; M Delome, of commerce; M Demontgouffer, of war; Admiral, Giguet Destouhes, Marine.

PARIS, November 21.-The Republique Francaise declares that in view of the Senate's pretensions and the President's refusal to change his policy, it becomes the clear duty of the Chamber of Deputies to refuse to vote on the budget. The Chamber must save the country. No budget must be voted as long as the majority has not a ministry in whom it can place confidence.

LONDON, November 21.-The Times has a leading article on the French situation, which concludes as follows: "The Moderate Right of the Senate did not mean to produce the mischief they have occasioned, but the result is before us. The powers of France arrayed against one another like army against army."

The Times' Paris correspondent commenting on the latest list of probable ministers, says: "Such a ministry must either resign after its first encounter with the Chamber of Deputies or the Chamber must be again dissolved. In the latter case a virtual coup d'etat is inevitable, and the Chamber could be elected in time to vote the budget, and the government would therefore have to collect taxes without authorization."

Telegraphic Briefs.

MONTREAL, Nov 21.-The steamship "Starling," here on the 12th inst, for Aberdeen, laden with grain, has been lost. The captain, his wife and twenty-five men were saved. The loss of the vessel and the cargo will amount to \$210,000.

NEW YORK, November 21.-Baby George, the infant acrobat, has been taken by the society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, and placed in the custody of the superintendent of the police, pending legal proceedings.

HARRISBURG, November 21.-Owing to the illness of Benjamin Harris Brewster, who represents the Western Union Telegraph Company in the quo warranto application before the Attorney General to-morrow, the hearing has been postponed until Saturday or Monday, and will take place in Philadelphia.

Meeting of the National Grange.

CINCINNATI, Nov 21.-The National Grange met here to-day. Delegates are present from all the States. The main part of the work of the meeting must be the crystallization and systematizing of grange work in general. A decision must be reached as to whether there shall be any longer a National Grange, and if so, what shall be its functions, powers and limitations.

SCARLET FEVER BREAKS UP A SCHOOL. BOSTON, Nov 21.-Owing to the prevalence of scarlet fever at Wellesly College the authorities have temporarily suspended the school. A portion of the young ladies have gone to their homes or to the houses of friends. The balance will be provided for by the trustees. About thirty persons are under treatment for this disease.

Business Failure.

CINCINNATI, Nov 21.-Harrison P Thompson, a Clarke county (Kent'ky) cattle dealer, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. Liabilities, \$275,591. Assets not stated. His creditors are mostly Kentucky banks.
