TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON. PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS. The Departments to be Investigated—The Female Ballot—W... a Hearing—Schurz will not Resign—The Tobacco Tax.

WASHINGTON, Jan 11.—The committee of the House agreed to report the steamboat bill in accordance with the views of the national board of steam navigation, recently in session here.

WASHINGTON, Jan 11.—House.—The proceedings opened with voting on the resolution reported from the committee of Ways and Means, directing the committees to investigate the several departments of the government.

WASHINGTON, Jan 11.—The St Petersburg Golos prints a special from Vienna which contradicts the St Petersburg dispatch to the London Times of the 7th inst., stating that it was rumored that Austria and Germany had vetoed the idea of opening the Dardanelles to Russian vessels only, and that Russia had consequently determined not to raise the question at all.

WASHINGTON, Jan 11.—The reply of Grand Duke Nicholas to the Turkish commander-in-chief, is that he would refer the latter's overture for an armistice to St Petersburg. He states that negotiations could only be conducted with him direct, and there could be no question at present of an armistice without the bases for peace.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan 11.—The most reliable gossip regarding North Carolina, is that Governor Vance will tender the Supreme Court Judgeship of the State to Senator Merrimon, and appoint Hon J M Leach for Merrimon's unexpired term, in consideration of his services in the campaign of 1876.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan 11.—The steamer "Belgie" has arrived here with advices from Hong Kong, to December 14th, and from Shanghai, to December 15th. There is no abatement of the ravages of the famine in the Northern provinces.

THE GREAT WAR.

Contradictory Reports About the Armistice.—It certainly has not been arranged—Russia will hardly agree to an Armistice unless Upon the Basis of Peace.—The Result of the Russian Success in the Schipka Pass.

LONDON, Jan 11.—The Agence Russe denies the truth of the statement that the Porte has already accepted a preliminary base of peace, and says: 'The Porte, however, is aware that the acceptance of these bases must be preceded by a conclusion of the armistice.'

VIENNA, Jan 11.—The Political Correspondence of the St Petersburg Golos has been relieved of command and summoned to Constantinople.

NEW YORK, Jan 11.—Superintendent Walling was notified last evening that Henry M Cutter, cotton broker, had swindled John Collins, of Brooklyn, out of \$25,000 worth of cotton by buying it under the pretence of sending it to North Adams, Mass, then putting it in a bonded warehouse, drawing \$8,000 on it, and running away.

BLANDS SILVER BILL.

The New York Cotton Exchange Condemns It.

NEW YORK, Jan 11.—There was a largely attended meeting of the Cotton Exchange held this afternoon, James F Wenman, President, in the chair. Resolutions were passed condemning the Bland silver bill, as its passage would be injurious to the whole cotton producing interest of the country, which is closely allied with the markets of the world.

VERSAILLES, Jan 11.—M Grevy was re-elected President of the Deputies by 385 votes out of a total of 846.

RICHMOND, VA, Jan 11.—The Roanoke river at Weldon, N C, is very high. The water at noon to-day was rising at the rate of six to eight inches per hour.
