

THE GREAT EASTERN QUESTION.

England Still Making Preparations for War---Austria also Mobilizing---The Russians Seem Bent on Entering Constantinople, and are Getting Tired Waiting for Peace Negotiations.

London, March 1.—A Times' edito-rial article, after pointing out the elerial article, after pointing out the ele-ments of weakness in the empire of Mr John Ruskin, the well known writthe Magyars and Sclavs and the leanings of the court towards the latter and of Count Andrassy towards the former, which antagonism is hardly kept within the loose bonds of the dual compromise by intelligence, patience and contempt for the race, and jealous-ies of the German provinces of the empire, concludes as follows: "It is time for Austria to emerge from this vacillation. There is much to be said in favor of the Magyar policy. There is much to be said for the Sclav policy, but there town. She has lost her bulwarks and is neither dignity nor safety in the overruling uncertainty of Vienna. Let the Austrian government speak a final word and England as well as Russia will know what to expect. A railroad from Danville to Statesville, via Winston, would save to the merchants and business men of our towns, alone, a sum not less \$25,000 a year in the matter of freights. This distance is only one hundred and fif-teen or twenty miles, and through a country where it would cost compara-tively little to build, at least, a narrow gauge railroad. Situated as we are, we are at the mercy of one road, and are compelled to summit to any freight tariff that this road sees proper to make.
