PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

The Pacific Railroad—Anti-Bellum Mail Contractors' Claims—Confederate Archives.

THE TARIFF BILL IN THE CABINET.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The Pacific Railroad committee heard Civil Engineer Owen this morning and resolved unanimously to report favorably on his bill for a survey by the War Department of the Topolarampo route from Austin, Texas, to Topolarampo harbor, on the Gulf of California.

The House is occupied with private bills. The Military committee had General Townsend before them, but lacking a quorum, postponed the examination.

The proceedings of the Ways and Means committee develop nothing important.

THE WAR TROUBLES.

THE COMING CONFERENCE.

Who Will Probably Preside and Where It Will Be Held—What France Wants and What Bismarck Thinks About the Occupation of Egypt.

LONDON, March 8.—A special to the Standard from Gallipoli reports the Russians actively constructing entrenchments from Katakoi to Sparkoi on the sea of Marmora. They have now about 18,000 men with cannon in these lines which confront the Turkish lines across the neck of the Gallipoli peninsula.

The Paris correspondent of the Times says it seems certain that France would readily consent to England's obtaining complete security in regard to the Suez Canal, but would do her utmost to dissuade England from occupying Egypt. France desires joint action with England respecting Egypt.

A Paris special to the Standard says Prince Bismarck recently stated that he would himself propose at the congress an English occupation of Egypt, Germany guaranteeing the non-intervention of France.

The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says: "The belief gains ground that if Prince Bismarck presides over the conference, Lord Beaconsfield will represent England. It is exceedingly improbable that the English delegate whoever he may be, will remain in the conference if it becomes apparent that the object of a majority of the powers is simply to endorse the Russo-Turkish bargain.

But if the conference means to do more than ratify the foregoing conclusions, there will be some important proposals affecting British interests in the Mediterranean, and the safety of the Suez Canal."

LONDON, March 8.—In the House of Lords to-day, Lord Derby said Persia has assured the government that she has no understanding with Russia regarding the cessation of the District of Caspian in exchange for the District of Baid.

In the Commons, Sir Stafford Northcote, chancellor of the exchequer, in reply to a question by Lord Harlington, the leader of the Liberals, said the government had informed Austria that it did not object to Berlin for the peace meeting conference. Sir Stafford Northcote also said that Lord Lyons will doubtless be the British plenipotentiary.

In reply to a question by Lord Granville, Lord Derby said the government is now communicating with other powers, principally Austria, regarding the basis on which the conference should proceed. The government had stated their opinion that not merely a part but the whole of the treaty between Russia and Turkey should be submitted to a congress.

A dispatch to Reuters from Pera says: "Reouf Pasha's departure for St. Petersburg to exchange ratifications of the treaty, has been postponed for a few days."

"After the 9th inst., a police regulation comes into effect by which the police may enter houses in Turkey occupied by foreigners without authority of the consuls."

SPARKS FROM THE WIRES. The Russian ministry of finance will send agents to the United States to study the American system of tobacco taxation.

Arrived at Liverpool, S Jorvath from Wilmington, N. C. It has on board the captain, mate, second mate and steward and the abandoned schooner Louisa Birdsall.

Governor Nicholls has called an extra session of the Louisiana Legislature.

Fire in Panama. NEW YORK, March 8.—A special dispatch from Panama reports a destructive fire there on Wednesday last. Three blocks in the principal portion of the city were destroyed; total loss, \$500,000; insurance, \$230,000, in German companies. The Grand Hotel was burned. It was insured for \$80,000. Original cost, \$100,000.

Upsetting the Arrangements of Tennessee Moonshiners.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Collector Cooper telegraphs from Knoxville, Tenn., that his raiders have captured five distilleries and arrested several persons in Johnson county.

OLD COTTON.—Mr Eldred Griffith purchased yesterday from Bob Smith, of Laurens, several bales of cotton 20 years old. The cotton had been carefully stored away and the staple is as good as if raised last year. For this same cotton the owner was at one time offered forty cents per pound in gold.—Greenville (S. C.) News, 8th.

NOTICE.

U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE SPECIAL TAXES.

Under the Revised Statutes of the United States Sections 2222, 2227, 2228 and 2229, every person engaged in any business, occupation, or employment, which renders him liable to a special tax, is required to "procure and place and keep conspicuously in his establishment or place of business a stamp" denoting the payment of said special tax for the special tax year beginning May 1, 1878. Section 2244, Revised Statutes, designates who are liable to special tax. A return, as prescribed on Form 11, is also required by law of every person liable to special tax as above. Severe penalties are prescribed for non-compliance with the foregoing requirements, or for continuing in business after April 30, 1878, without payment of tax.
