TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE TROUBLOUS TREATY. Sick Romans Re-Joining their Commands—Germany's Mediation Thus Far a Failure—The English Navy Improving and Moving Eastward—The Russians Taking the Same Steps—No Brighter Peace Prospects—Threats of Russian Occupation of Constantinople.

London, April 20.—A special from Vienna to the Daily News reports that convalescent Russians have been ordered to join their regiments in Turkey as quickly as possible. The Standard states that the Duke of Edinburgh will remain in the Mediterranean for the present.

A telegram from Athens says England has arranged a truce in Thessaly. The Turks have retired to their fortresses and the insurgents to Greece. The Times' Bucharest dispatch says the Russian officials at Bucharest are preparing 16,000 transport carts to provide against the Black Sea. Lines of communication being closed by the British fleet.

The Times' Vienna correspondent is evidently unaware of the hitch in the negotiations for the congress, but considers the change of the ministry in Turkey a new element of danger. As Ahmed Yefik Effendi's presence in the cabinet was a guarantee that nothing would be attempted against England, his sudden removal, says the correspondent, looks as though the Russians had endeavored to steal a march on England while the negotiations for a settlement were pending.

The week closes with the prospects of the Eastern difficulty no brighter. The News' St. Petersburg correspondent throws the responsibility of the alleged failure of the German mediation on England in having rejected the proposal that the congress should be summoned to revise the treaties of 1856 and 1871 and again insisting on her original condition. However this may be it is certain that new difficulties have arisen. The negotiations, it is said, continue, and may still lead to a satisfactory result, but the present delay shows that the former divergence of views is again apparent.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 20.—Nothing is known here of the recall of Grand Duke Nicholas from the command of the army. ST. PETERSBURG, April 20.—An order is officially published to-day, that the necessary number of men be called out from the naval reserve to form three corps of sailors for service in the fleet, two of which are to be stationed in the neighborhood of Constantinople at Cronstadt and the third at Nikoloff. Several of to-day's papers state that the proposition for a preliminary conference should be accepted as a means of ascertaining the real intentions of England.

PARIS, April 20.—The papers here publish a telegram from Berlin, dated to-day, stating that England and Russia have agreed to the principle of the simultaneous withdrawal of the British fleet and the Russian troops from the neighborhood of Constantinople, but the points to which they will withdraw have not been decided upon. TRIPOLI, April 20.—Gen Melikoff will start for St. Petersburg to-morrow. The Caucasian army corps will be disbanded.

LONDON, April 20.—The Central News says: 'The Indian government have chartered five steamers for the conveyance of troops from India three of which are taken for three months, their primary destination being Port Said. The other two are engaged for ten months. One, the St. Asapp, a celebrated Australian steamer of fifty-five hundred tons burthen, is capable of transporting five thousand men, and the Nankin, of thirty-five hundred tons is capable of carrying a full regiment. The United Service Gazette, (weekly) issued to-day, says that it has good reason for stating that there will be a strong combined channel and Baltic fleet formed during the next two months. The Pera correspondent of the Times writing on the military situation at the Turkish capital says: 'Although many things warrant the supposition that the Turks would fight to keep the Russians out of Constantinople, they have not distinctly made up their minds to do so. But admitting a theoretical one. Ninety thousand Ottoman soldiers around the capital are an insuperable barrier to a surprise. The Russians know very well that if they want to make a coup de main until war is declared the chances against them will be much heavier than if they make it beforehand. They have everything at their command—force, money, diplomacy and intrigue. It does not require a very lively imagination to conceive how, when Russia has made up her mind that it is necessary to come into Constantinople, she will secure the prize. WASHINGTON NOTES AND DISPATCHES.

The Principal Being the Committee's Report Reducing the Tobacco Tax. WASHINGTON, April 20.—Major Turner, of Texas, appeared before the House Judiciary committee to-day in behalf of the Texas Pacific in the matter of the El Paso franchise. Mr. Campbell concludes the argument Wednesday in behalf of the French bondholders under Fremont's contracts. The House is in committee of the Whole.

HOUSE.—The postoffice appropriation occupied the day. Tucker, of Virginia, from the committee on Ways and Means, reported the bill in regard to the tax on tobacco, imports and other internal taxation. The committee on Ways and Means, only six members being present, agreed to report the amendatory internal revenue bill, levying a tax of 18 cents per pound on tobacco, \$5 per thousand on cigars, \$1.25 per thousand on cigarettes, not weighing more than 87 pounds. The income tax is two per cent on all sums over two thousand dollars. While some of the members of the committee agreed that the bill should be reported, they reserved the right to support it or not, as they may deem proper.

MERCANTILE MEXICO. An Insurrection Against the Diaz Government Steadily Ripening. SAN ANTONIO, TEX., April 20.—Reliable information just received here from the interior of the Mexican border states that an insurrection against the Diaz government is steadily but surely ripening. It is understood that the Lerdist party are urging the Mexican Indians to renew their raiding operations in order to bring matters on the Rio Grande to their former state as regards the United States. The commanding officer of the sub-district of the Peos telegraphs to department headquarters that the Mexican Indians are acting in concert with the Indians from Fort Stanton reservation, who are now on an extensive raid in Texas.

SPARKS FROM THE WIRES. Rev P F Lyndon, vicar-general of the arch-diocese of Boston, died Friday night after a brief illness. James Wadsworth, a Chicago commission merchant, has failed. Letters to New York from General Macco say the Cuban provisional government has been formed and hostilities against the Spaniards renewed. The silk operatives of Paterson, N J, were paid in gold yesterday for the first time in seventeen years.

The New Orleans Races Yesterday. NEW ORLEANS, April 20.—In the hurdle race here to-day Dolgous won. Risk took the first heat. The race was close and exciting. Mile heats, three year olds: Fred Rice won the first and third, and Captain E R Hand won the second. In the two miles, for all ages, Typhoon won.

Good Passenger Lists and Full Freights for Europe. NEW YORK, April 20.—Six steamers for Europe to-day take good lists of passengers and full freight, including 255,000 bushels of grain, 200,000 American cigars, large quantities of dry goods, beef and all kinds of provisions and produce, canned meats, 300 head of cattle, 64 horses, etc.
