TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. WASHINGTON.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS. Bill to Remove the Tax from State Banks—\$75,000 for the New Orleans Mint—Specie Resumption—Repeal—Blaine Investigates the New York River and Harbor Bill Passes the House.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Harris of Tennessee, introduced a bill to repeal section 3,412 of the revised statutes, which provides for a tax on the notes of State banking associations. Referred to the committee on Finance.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The House committee on Commerce has agreed to allow \$50,000 for New Orleans harbor, \$100,000 for the Gulf of Mexico, and \$100,000 for Bayou Lafourche.

The Louisiana delegation will vote for the river and harbor bill in its present shape, but will appeal to the Senate committee to increase the Southwestern appropriation.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The House committee on Finance, today reported a bill to repeal the specie resumption act, reported by the committee on Finance on Wednesday last, so as to strike out that portion naming October 1st, 1878, as the time when United States notes shall be receivable for imports, so as to read that "from and after the passage of this act United States notes shall be receivable in payment of the 4 per cent bonds now authorized by law to be issued, and for duties on imports."

WASHINGTON, April 22.—At Blackburn, Saturday, delegates representing the card-room hands of fourteen districts unanimously resolved to persevere in the strike and use all legitimate means to support the strikers.

THE TROUBLOUS TREATY.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Since the defalcation of Chase, the treasurer of the Union Mills, considerable uneasiness has been felt about the solvency of the Border City and Sagamore Mills, of which Gen Hathaway is treasurer.

FRANKLIN, La., April 22.—Jackson Edwards, Wesley Turner and Alexander Brown, colored men, have suffered the extreme penalty of law here today.
