King's Mountain High School.

King's Mountain, April 25.

Editor Charlotte Observer :--Nothing of general interest having transipired the past week, I propose to devote this letter to a running descrip-tion of King's Mountain High School. This village owes much to the school, as students are gathered from both North and South Carolina, and are said to spend more than a thousand dollars a month here. The school is

The school was opened two years since, and its growth and prosperity has been most remarkable. The roll of the present scholastic year contains about one hundred and thirty names. The present attendance is ninety odd, about fifty of whom are from out of

The principal, Capt W T R Bell, is a graduate of William and Mary College, and has had ten years' experience as a teacher, eight of which he was principal of the Harlowe Academy, Carteret county, N.C. He has served in the State Legislature with distinction. He is a fine classical student and a public speaker of great power, as was demon-strated in his temperance lectures while president of the State Temper-

ance Society.

Mr C C Williams, a graduate of Boston University, Boston, Mass, is the first assistant and has charge of mathe-

tired from the main streets. From the building one has an extensive view, taking in the Blue Ridge, some sixty miles distant, and King's Mountain, only a good walking distance removed. The building is a two story structure, especially adapted to its use. The first floor is occupied by the girls' rooms, a music room and a reading room. The second floor is used for the boys' recitation and study room and another room which is soon to be used as a primary school. The school is co-educational—about one fourth of the pupils being girls.

course of studies, but each student is allowed as much liberty in his choice of studies as is possible among so many. Young men are prepared for col-lege and sent into the sophomore year sometimes. Others are prepared for business life, and still others receive

business life, and still others receive personal attention in bringing up any study in which they are deficient, and those who are simply taking a winter's schooling are carefully instructed.

The village is very healthy and sickness among the students is almost unknown. While in the Legislature Capt Bell was instrumental in having a bill passed prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within a mile of the school, and the law is rigidly enforced. There are few temptations opened to the boys, and the cost of living is very moderate. The average expenses for the session of ten months, exclusive of clothing and travelling expenses, is set down at elling expenses, is set down at \$120. The class of students which have congregated here are well disposed and highly respected by the citizens. The male students sustain a debating society and the girls have a reading club which meets semi weekly. Our citizens are proud of our school. as they may justly be.

Railroad Meeting at Mooresville, Iredell County,

An enthusiastic meeting of the merchants, other business men, and citizens of this town, was held at the Mooresville Academy on the evening of the 19th inst, for taking into consideration the propriety of aiding in the construction of a narrow guage railroad from the city of Danville, Va, via Leaksville, Madison, through the county of Stokes, Salem and Winston, Farmington, Mocksville, from thence to an intersection with the Western North Carolina, and from thence to the town of Mooresyille, on the Atlantic Tennessee and Ohio Railroad. of the 19th inst, for taking into consid-

J R McCorkle, Isaac Harris and A Leazer, urging the importance of this matter, it was resolved that a copy of these proceedings be sent to the Salem and Winston papers for publication, with the request that other papers friendly to the enterprise copy them.
