

General Butler on the Fall Elections.

[Wash. Dispacth to Boston Herald.] General Butler thinks, if the campaign follows the precedents, the next House will be Democratic. "Of course House will be Democratic. "Of course no one can tell," said the Essex statesman to a Herald reporter, "how the scale will turn until after adjournment; but it is a little curious to take a retrospective glance over the history of congressional organizations. Since the time of Jackson, and that is about as far back as my political recollection reaches, each new President, with one exception, has entered office with a exception, has entered office with a majority in the House of his own political faith, and each of these Presidents has had the fortune, good or bad, to have the opposition get control of the lower house at the beginning of the second Congress. In the case of Mr Lincoln, his party friends had control of the second Congress, but the conditions were exceptional, for, at that time, you will remember, twothirds of his political enemies were not admitted to representation in Con-gress at all. Grant's administration was really the only exception within the period I have named to the general rule. In his first term the second Congress was organized by the election of a Republican Speaker. In his second election, although he carried more than two thirds of all the electoral votes, he saw the Democrats of the Forty-fourth Congress take possession by an immense majority. Washington, D. C. May 11.—Mr Bushnell, the United States commercial agent at Gaboon, writes to the Department of State that the missionary enterprise continues to follow in the path of Mr Stanley's discoveries. Two missionaries, Messrs Strom and Crayen, have recently spent a few days at Gaboon, en route for the Congo, now the Livingston river. They have been sent out by philanthropic merchants of Liverpool and London to ascend the south bank of the river to a point above the first rapids, where they are to establish an industrial Christian mission. Such enterprises, Mr Bushnell adds, will prepare the way for the extension of commerce and steam navigation upon the vast interior rivers of Ethiopia, and the development of her valuable natural re-
