

STATE MEDICAL SOCIETY.

In Session at Coldsboro-Interesting Proceedings.

[From the Raleigh News.]

GOLDSBORO, May 15. STATE HOARD OF HEALTH. Dr Satchwell, president of the State Board of Health, called up the subject of the board and proceeded to state the progress made in the great work of sanitary improvement in North Caro-lina. He said that much had been done under the act of the last Legisla-ture establishing the board and was sanguine that the next General Assembly would make up for any imperfections of the present provisions of the law. The people, he said, are with us in this important matter of preventive medicine, and the board were encouraged to move forward in their arduous

Dr Wood, secretary of the Board of Health, made a full report of the workor O'Hagan made an eloquent address on the benefits of the work.

Dr Moore, of Charlotte, being called on, responded in a most appropriate

BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS. Dr Satchwell moved that the society proceed to the election, by ballot, of the State Board of Medical Examiners, as the term of the present board had expired by law. He accompanied his motion with some forcible remarks on the importance of the board as a most valuable auxiliary in the great cause of medical improvement and reform in this State and its assistance in the needed works of a higher standard of qualifications on the part of those furned loose annually as doctors upon the community by the medical colleges of the country; having for six years been a member of the board he knew something of its arduous labors and responsibilities and was opposed to the election of any one as a member who was not known to possess a high personal and professional character. The members should be selected from every section of the State. He nominated the following ticket, which was duly elected: Drs T F Wood, H T Bahnson, T D Haigh, G L Kirby, P E Hines, Joseph Graham and R J Hicks.
