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STATE NEWS.

Mrs. Elizabeth Graz, of Salisbury, is dead. There are 1,251 post offices in this State.

The Blount residence in Raleigh is to be sold. Raleigh will observe union decoration day.

Judge Henry has just held his last court in Pitt county. Elizabeth city is now connected by telegraph with the outside world.

Raleigh Observer: Wilmington city property is valued at just \$2,101,505 higher than Raleigh.

A Rowan man forgot it was Sunday and went to town to buy goods. He returned by the back streets.

Wilmington Star: It has been suggested that the representatives of the old Third Regiment take the initiative in holding a reunion in the city at an early date of the boys who wore the gray from this section.

Greensboro Patriot: Frank Mills, colored, who brought to this city yesterday by Oliver A. V. Herring, under a commitment from J. D. Powers, Esq., of Union township, Funder county, on the charge of rape, the alleged victim being a white woman. He was committed to the county prison without benefit of bail.

Greensboro Patriot: D. W. O. Bank attended the meeting of stockholders of Mt. Airy narrow gauge at Mt. Airy last Saturday. The people at that end of the line, seem to be determined to begin the work, and a hundred convicts secured from the Penitentiary will be put to work grading at once.

Salisbury Watchman: Our farmers say that the wheat crop is much damaged this year owing to rust. There will hardly be a half a crop in this section.
