Editor tharjotte Observer:

I read with his a great deal of interest the letter of W. C., on "Sanitary Precautions in Villages," and endorse fully what he says. As strengthening his admirable suggestions, I will cite an instance or two of the evil effects to cities, towns and villages of non-attention to privies and sinks, and what has been done in one instance, by proper attention thereto. Before the late war the city of New Orleans was a hot-bed of isease, in which yellow fever was almost annually epidemic, with the periodical invasions of its companion scourge, cholera. The general belief was that they were introduced from foreign ports. Ben Butler, with all of the persecutions that during the war, he inflicted upon that city, has left behind him a cause for gratitude. As commander of the department he feared the attack of yellow fever on his troops, saw that the quarantine of a strictly enforced blockade did not prevent its appearance, and decided at once that the cause was in the city itself. It, by its peculiar conformation, cannot be drained by a system of sewers, being between a river and a lake, nearly flat and at times below the level of the water in both river and lake. Hence everything in the shape of decaying matter must be upon or above the surface. The privies were either surface or in cemented vaults or chambers above the surface. These filled the city day and night, with the most horrible odors. This he said was a cause of disease to be dreaded, and using his power as a military commander, he at once had the whole city cleaned and thoroughly deodorized and required it
