### DREARY ORATORY.

The Bore of a House Session "For Debate Only."

The other night I attended a session "for debate only." It was all very dismal, except the brilliant array of gas jets in the night session. At a cost of about \$50 an hour, the lights were twenty spectators present, the cost of their entertainment was \$2.50 an hour each, and some of the unappreciative wretches were nodding, too.

Of members present there were just fifteen by actual count, when I arrived. A North Carolina member, with a harsh voice and a bald head, was making a great effort on the condition of the country. But he was soon disappointed. There was a painful lack of appreciation. The gas jets looked on approvingly. Of the fifteen members not one seemed to listen to or care what the North Carolina intellect was trying to evolve. The speaker glanced up towards the ladies' gallery. It was vacant. Upon the other side were two negroes, but one was asleep and the other didn't seem to understand the speech. Turn his eyes where he would vacant seats only met his gaze. "I am not used to the like of this," he finally broke out; "there is here but a beggarly array of empty benches, and I ask to print the balance of my speech in the Record." This was granted, of course, it always is. Then another member got up, drew out an inspiring roll of manuscript, and in a few minutes a great speech, ripped his massive brow, and asked leave to have it printed in the Record (the speech, not the brow). There was an "unanimous consent," for all of the fifteen present wished to do likewise. Another and another followed, and then the "session for debate only" closed. Out of curiosity I looked at the next day's issue of the Record, and found that it contained seventy pages of closely-printed matter; nor were all the speeches in it that had been "delivered" the night before. Some of them were withheld for revision.

The excuse given for this monstrous abuse is that it is less expensive to make the Record an escape valve for superfluous gas than to have it explode in the House, and that it is devoted to public business. These speeches printed, but never delivered (and sometimes written for the weighty member by some impetuous "literary fellow"), are sent broadcast to the district to which the member is credited, and serve an important purpose in siding his re-nomination. The country squires and village postmasters read the "great effort," and picture in the mind's eye the speaker's member, who is consoling himself with the thought that he has done his duty to the country by the promulgation of ideas. If, in addition to the "great speech," the member has secured an appropriation to clean out the water courses and fill up the frog ponds of his "district," the job is done and his re-nomination is virtually assured.

The University Normal School—The Opening Exercises.

Editor Charlotte Observer—

It may interest your many readers, especially those who have friends here—and I see that Charlotte, Concord, Salisbury and Statesville are already represented at the Normal—to learn that this great school, which is "of the people, for the people and by the people," began yesterday, with deeply interesting services, in the University chapel. There were at least 200 teachers in town, 110 of whom recorded their names yesterday morning. Professors Ladd, Melver, Page, Graves, Wilson, Noble, Winston and Miss Coe, are here. Professor Owens will be here on Thursday, Maj Hotchkiss, the geographer, the 1st, and Mr Watson, the elocutionist, on the 7th of July. All is going merrily as a marriage bell. The greetings of the second year Normalists are very hearty. The classes will be formed to-day, and the instructions will begin tomorrow.

President Battle was, of course, the welcome of the first gathering of the Normalists. Professor Ladd was the last speaker. He felicitated himself on being thus connected with a movement which had already made a deep impression in the States, especially because of its unparalleled magnitude and magnanimity. He is sure that it will work a revolution in education in our Southern States." Professor Ladd's experience, in coming south of Mason and Dixon's line since the war, and being advanced to a high official position, which he maintained with much purity in the conservative States, of Virginia is an example of the kindness and confidence with which Southerners receive and treat Northerners when they mind their own business and let others, who are "to the manner born," mind theirs.
