

[Augusta (Ga) Chronicle.] At the annual meeting of the Enterprise Factory last March, the directors were authorized to issue 8 per cent bonds to the amount of \$160,000, for the purpose of increasing the capacity of the mill to 15,000 spindles. The bonds were issued and \$36,000 were sold to different parties at par. Yesterday Mr P L Cohen, of the firm of J J Cohen & Son, purchased for a syndicate in this city the remainder of the bonds, amounting to \$124,000, at 95 and interest. Very few of the bonds have been sold outside of Augusta. The new machinery, about 6,000 spindles, will be put in the mill in a short time, increasing its capacity to between 14,000 and 15,000 spindles.
