Concord, N. C., June 3rd, 1878. day will tell you that the report tele-graphed to your paper was a painful truth from beginning to end, except, perhaps, too much stress was put on the word delegate. A great many of his delegates wanted the convention to proceed.

As late as nine days before the con-vention assembled I received a private letter from a gentleman of this county, who, at one of the township meetings, moved to make Mr Means' nomination unanimous, and in the course of it he writes: 'There is going to be a powerful effort made to either nominate Col Means or burst the convention on the 29th." And this letter, written on the 20th, nine days before the convention met, shows that preparations were then being made to break up the con-vention. Later on further and more decided preparations were inaugurated, in proof of which let me add the fel-

lowing:

[Spartan.] Although it has been announced that Mr W J or "Asa" Pool had been bitten by a mad dog, it was hoped that the malady would never exhibit itself in his case, as he seemed cheerful and without fear as to the result. On last Monday, the forty-eighth day after he was bitten, Mr Pool began to feel some pain in the wounds, which had entirely healed, and these pains gradually in-creased until his visiting physician, Dr Russell, became satisfied that it was a

genuine case of hydrophobia. All of the physicians in town went out to see Mr Pool, but nothing could be done to relieve him, as the remedies applied seemed ineffectual. He became more nervous and excited from day to day until at last spasm after spasm came in rapid succession, the victim evidently suffering intensely. He was not vicious or dangerous, but walked and ran about the yard, calling piteously for help, and sometimes screaming out in his agony. Parties remained with him, and as he became more furious it was found necessary to lock him up in order to keep him from running away, and at last he had to be confined by being bound up in a sheet, and kept in an outhouse to which he had previousan outhouse to which he had previously been moved. It was a sad—a horrible death, and it was a sad sight to those present to see this helpless, harm less man in a high state of nervous excitement, with dilated pupils, and spasmodic efforts, suffering intensely, moving to and fro in the vain attempts to find relief. He was in a very debilitated state, and at last his sufferings ended with his death about 9 o'clock on Thursday night. Mr Pool was a clever, good natured, inoffensive a clever, good natured, inoffensive man, with many friends and relatives, who are deeply grieved over his death. and our whole community are horror-
