A Card from Mr. W. H. Bailey.

Editor Charlotte Observer— In your daily of this date I am amazed to see inserted a card from W. H. Deaver in which without a word of explanation accompanying it, you permit him to say of me that (myself) must remember that but for the agency of the laws he too would have worn the striped jacket and worked in the tunnel.

I apprehend that every one who knows me will understand at once that the writer alludes to my pardon for the supposed crime of having been a Confederate soldier; and the points conveyed by it is alike applicable to all who participated from Lee down—including yourself; but as your paper is widely circulated in and out of the State, I do think that common justice requires (whatever may be your personal feelings towards me) that this statement should reach those who are not sufficiently familiar with me to correct it from their own observation and judgment.

I have no further comments to make on the card, as you have editorially disposed of the authorship, but allow me to respectfully suggest that if a witness, whom a lawyer, in the proper line of his duty, sees fit to castigate, is allowed to abuse the lawyer through the papers, an unfortunate antagonism between the liberty of speech and defense of litigants, on the one hand, and the liberty of the press, on the other, will be inaugurated.

I do so should be allowed to insult every Confederate in insulting me? You yourself complimented my speech and praised its supposed severity. I think it the right and duty of the press where a lawyer goes out of the evidence to denounce a party or witness, to denounce him, but so long as his remarks, however severe and caustic, are based upon evidence, sound policy requires that he should not be attacked. It will have the effect of deterring lawyers from doing their whole duty.

I shall notice the other matter in the card except by simply stating that Deaver has been wholly misinformed and my duty as an attorney, beyond that point says my lips.
