

THE GREAT LOUISVILLE RACE.

In Which Ten Broeck Distances the California Mare in the First Heat.

Louisville, July 4.—At 10 o'clock this morning the streets were wellnigh impassable, the buildings were handsomely decorated, and unparalleled interest was felt in the great eyent of the

The first race was a dash of a mile 2.18. The second race was a sweep-stakes for two year-olds, and was won by Goodnight, with Kenton second and Charlemagne third; time 1.20.

When the drum tapped for the great four-mile race to day Ten Broeck and Mollie McCarthy went by the string like twin bullets. Ten Broeck had the outside of the track, and the mare, being on the inside, ran to the front from the start. At the first quarter they were side by side and going gallantly on to victory. The half mile did not change the position, and as they moved onward the thirty thousand spectators were held in perfect silence. Between the half and three quarters the tween the half and three-quarters the mare got her nose ahead and a great cheer went up, and then as they came past the string and she again appeared in the front another cheer was heard. The mare was moving easy, but Ten Broeck was being driven hard. In the second mile Mollie seemed to
