STATE NEWS.

Mt Pleasant, Cabarrus, is said to have 500 inhabitants.

The Register says that one of Concord's needs is "a comfortable calaboose."

The sum of \$700 has been raised toward re-modelling the academy at Rockingham.

They say Judge C O Pool will beat Jo Martin for the congressional nomination, in the first district, and then the Democratic nominee will beat him.

Happy Home Educator: On the day the Burke candidates spoke at Upper Fork last week, fifteen jugs were counted sitting in a branch near by, like crocks of milk in a spring house.

A colored boy rescued a little child of Mr Jno Seaford from drowning in Coddle creek, Cabarrus county, Sunday last. The Concord Sun speaks very highly of his bravery, but does not give his name.

Wilmington Review: Dr and Mrs Thos B Carr, of this city, celebrated their silver wedding last evening. Relatives and friends of Dr and Mrs Carr assembled at their residence on Market street and passed two or three hours very pleasantly.

A cattle show and picnic will be held at Poplar Tent, Cabarrus county, next Thursday, under the auspices of the Pomona Grange. It is said that Col Polk, Capt S B Alexander, Dr Davis and other well known speakers will be there.

The Spirit of the South says a very nice sail boat has been placed in the Poe Dock-Factory pond at Rockingham, by Mr Thos A Robbins and others. It is 20 feet long by about 6 feet wide, and was built at Hamlet by Mr Bryce.

The editor of the Happy Home Educator, being a new hand at the business, sometimes forgets himself and says "I" instead of the conventional "we." Presently he will begin to use "we," and he'll have it in every other line.

Two young men, John and Lewis Robinson, were arrested in Burke county, last week, charged with the murder of George Houk, the man whose body was found on the railroad track, and who was at first thought to have been killed by the train. It has been proven that before the train passed Houk and the Robinsons had a difficulty. All the parties were drunk.

Concord Sun: A citizen of Stanley, Mr J M Whitley, died last Thursday. His death resulted, so it is believed, from the effects of a blow which he received on the head about two years ago, at the hands of Mr Green Whitley. We know none of the particulars of the affair, but give the above as it is told us by a gentleman from that county.

It is said that these Greenbackers, in connection with the Republicans, are to get out a ticket for Congress, and will run Daniel L Russell, in which event they will be pretty effectually wiped out at the polls.

He was then locked up in the guard house. Another negro, Doc Austin, drunk, was officious at the first ward polls. He was arrested. A negro ran from the scene of arrest and informed the court house crowd of the occurrence, and said "Let's take the polls." As one man, with whoops and cries, they ran to the Baptist Grove. The street was filled with the rush of blacks, as they streamed to the scene. On arrival there, their ardor cooled and they did not take the polls. The negro Austin was lead off and stowed away in the guard house, while the rampant rough who started the court house crowd was made to share his quarters.

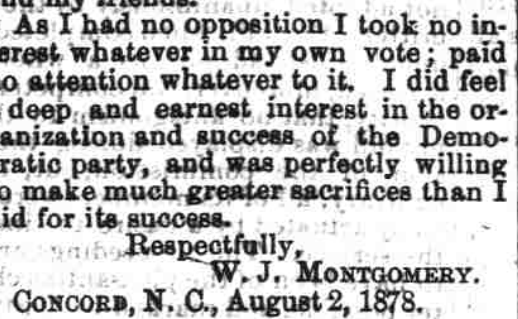
