Postal Regulations. It has been determined by the post office department to extend the registry system to third class matter, and a formal order to this effect will soon be issued. This change will go into effect October 1st, but it will not be merely experimental or confined to ten large offices as recommended by the recent convention of railway superintendents, but will take effect generally and become a feature of the regular postal system.

Merchants' Privilege Tax. It is a fact that a great many merchants in the city have not paid the privilege tax for this year. The inferior Court meets next week, and it is made the duty of the sheriff to return the list of delinquents to the grand jury who are bound to present all such to the court, where they will be prosecuted for the neglect. By paying the tax this week merchants can save themselves the cost and fines, which otherwise will most surely be imposed.

Diphtheria in Salisbury. It is learned here that this terrible disease is prevailing to a very considerable extent in Salisbury and the vicinity, in a form which has proven fatal in several cases. Mr. A. S. Lewter, the agent of the North Carolina Railroad at that place, has lost two of his children, the deaths occurring so near together that both the corpses were carried to Durham, Mr. Lewter's old home, on the same train.

Case in Bankruptcy. Register Keogh announces that Andrew R. Henderson, of Mecklenburg county, bankrupt upon the petition of his creditors, has applied to the court for relief from all his debts prior to the 16th day of July, 1878. A meeting of his creditors to appoint an assignee of his estate will be held at Charlotte on the 19th day of August, 1878, at 4 p.m., before the register, when and where all persons interested are notified to appear.

Loss of Money. Mrs. Linwood, a Massachusetts lady, got on the Charlotte and Statesville train at Charlotte Friday evening, to go to Statesville. When the conductor came around for tickets she reached in her pocket and discovered that her money was gone. It could not be found in the car, and the supposition is that the roll, amounting to \$110, fell out of her shallow pocket at the depot, as she remembers having it in the omnibus. Up to this time the missing property has not been found.

Capt. Crawford's Candidacy. A note from Salisbury says that Capt. W. H. Crawford had not announced himself a candidate for Congress, but it is understood here that he will be a candidate if the Republicans do not put out a man. It is asserted that he will do nothing to jeopardize the party, but if the field is left open to Democrats, he will probably wade in as an independent Democrat. As the matter of his probable candidacy has attracted considerable newspaper comment, it is due him to say this much. It is claimed that he has many influential friends in the district, who are urging the matter.

Yesterday's Fierce Heat. Yesterday's heat exceeded that of any day of the season by 3 degrees, as may be seen by reference to the thermometer record published at the head of the local columns this morning, the highest point reached up to yesterday at Wilson & Burwell's drug store, being 90°. At many other places in the city the mercury stood three or four degrees higher, and at one time it reached 100 in the OBSERVER'S office. About 12 o'clock the heat was intensely oppressive, but during the remainder of the day a strong breeze greatly relieved the suffering from the heat, which otherwise would have been almost unendurable. Only those who were compelled to do so, subjected themselves to the fierce rays of the sun, and very little business was done. Yesterday will be known in the calendar as the hottest day Charlotte ever experienced.
