Fearful Extirpation. [Hillsboro Recorder.] The fatality in the afflicted family of Chatham, caused by diphtheria, has already been mentioned. Entering the house, he found the un-happy father seated in a chair with two of his little ones on his knees, one evidently dying, the other violently ill.
While in the house, the dying one
breathed its last, and the visitor took the body to place it upon a bed. To his horror he found the bed already occupied by two corpses of little ones who had previously died. In another room he found the mother extremely sick, and an infant exhibiting the first symptoms of diphtheria. Before the visitor left the house the first child died, and shortly afterwards the mother and the infant—the whole family followed—and
