ing smile, "Oh, I always carry that." The Dean, whose full name is Arthur Penhryn Stanley, is a son of the Bishop of Norwich. He was born in Hampshire, England, and was educated at Rugby and Oxford. At the latter institution he obtained the Baloil College scholarship and presently the Newdigate prize for an English poem called the "Gypsies." After that prizes came thick and fast, and in 1856 he was Select Preacher at Oxford. Later he was secretary of the Oxford University Commission, Canon of Canterbury, Regius Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Oxford, Canon of Christ's church, chap-lain to the Bishop of London, and final-ly Dean of Westminster, a position betirely out of sight. His ears are still above ground, swaying to and fro in the soft autumn breeze.—

Judge Christian delivered the opinion of the court.
