On Growing Put or Lean.

D. in New York Sun.] Having paid some attention to the subject of increasing and diminishing the amount of adipose tissue in the human frame, perhaps I may be permitted to say a word on the matter. It is quite true that certain kinds of diet are more fat-forming than others, but it does not therefore follow that a person living on this kind of diet—say, for instance, buckwheat cakes and Barbadoas sugar -will become fat: In many cases which have come under my own observation all attempts to increase the amount of fat by means of a special diet (carbona-ceous) have ended in the person becom-ing bilious and suffering from a con-gested liver and constipation. On the other hand, I have known persons fat-ten on bread and water. The late Mr. Swaim, of Philadelphia, for many years of his life ate nothing but bread and molasses, and vet he was a short healthy-looking man. Mr. Mechi, the eminent English agriculturist, according to his own statement, can increase his weight materially by merely taking an extra lump or two of sugar in his tea. Another gentleman became fat and ruddy-cheeked by adding a pint of ale to his midday repast. But these are exceptional cases. As a general rule, if a person in good health, obtaining seven or eight hours' sleep per night, and not overworked, does not get fat on a mix-ed diet, he won't get fat at all, and neither buckwheat cakes and Barbadoes sugar nor cod liver oil nor any other producer will fatten him. Sound sleep is one of the best fat producers I know of, and then it has the advantage of increasing the general health and strength at the same time. Beware of altering your diet for the mere purpose of putting on more flesh. Results may follow that you dream not of. It is easier to reduce flesh than to in-

crease it as a general rule. But there may be danger even here. Many of those obese gentlemen who followed the Banting system, and tried to live on lean meat, a very little bread, and a glass or two of sherry per day, found hemselves with seriously disordered kidneys, the result of a highly nitrogenous diet. They might have obtained that looseness for which they sighed, and retained their health, had they reduced the total quantity of food con-sumed, and eaten less bread, potatoes, and starchy food, and more turnips, cabbages, beets, cucumbers, tomatoes, melons, and other watery articles of iet, and taken more exercise and less sleep. As a rule, fat people are large eaters. They will tell you they are not. Don't believe them. Flesh and fat are not formed out of nothing. A stout youth of my acquaintance told me that he ate "a mere nothing," and only slept four hours per diem. I found that he really ate as much at one meal as I could eat at three, took little or no exercise, and slept nine or ten hours out of the twenty-four. "Laugh and grow fat" is an old saying, but I have not found fat people, as a rule, mirthful, but, on the contrary, rather grave. I mean the very fat, not the merely plump. I have, too, met with fat people who were exceedingly nervous, though it is generally supposed that nervous people must necessasily be

opinion of many, particularly the young and strong and vigorous, that winter especially a sharp, frosty one, with plenty of snow—is the most healthy season of the year. Very few seem to realize the fact that cold is the condition of death, and that in warm and cold climates it is our unconscious effort to maintain our bodily heat at a temperathe maintenance of a sufficiently elevated bodily temperature becomes very often a difficulty too great for our strength, the advent of a severe winter is really more to be dreaded than a visitation of a pestilence. The saying, "heat is life—cold is death," has a striking illustration and confirmation in the reports now regularly submitted by Dr. Russell to the Glasgow sanitary committee. The death rate rises and falls with the thermometer. So many degrees less heat, so many more deaths, and vice versa. In one of his fortnightly reports Dr. Russell says: "The death rate in the first week of the fortnight was twenty-one, and in the second week twenty-five. The mean temperature in the former week was 40.8 degrees Fahrenheit, in the latter 39.5 degrees." He attributes the low rate of the first week to the high mean temperature of the preceding fortnight, which was 47.03 degrees, and adds: "This is a good illustration of a law which we frequently observe in these reports of temperature and death rates that a week of low temperature produces a rise in mortality the week fol-lowing." In our climate it would probably be difficult to find a more frequent cause of serious ailments than taking cold. Whatever weak place we have, whatever constitutional disorder we us.
