He says: "Prior to the great calamity of the late civil war, I had been for more than thirty years much devoted to investigating the nature and principles of our Federal and State governments; and during that period, having been several times profoundly exercised as to the true and lawful powers of each, not as a politi-cian, but as a citizen truly devoted to my country, I was unable, under my conviction of the solemn duties of patriotism, to give any excuse for or countenance to the civil war of 1861, without sacrificing all self respect. My judg-ment was the instructor of ing conscience; and no man suffered greater misery than did I as the scenes of battle unfolded the bloody carnage of war around and in the midst of our homes. "I had been taught under the deep
