Railroad Notes.

The following interesting document has come into the hands of Mr. W. F. Davidson. The author of it, Gen. Geo. Graham, was an uncle of the late Gov. George Graham was born the 5th day of December 1757; Commiss'd an ensign in Meck. 6th Militia, 5th day of December 1777; Commiss'd a Lieut, in Do. 5th day of December 1781; Commiss'd a Lieut. in State Troops of S. C. 5th day of December 1781; Commiss'd a Capt. in Meck. 6th militia, 5th day of December 1784; Commiss'd 2 and acquaintances. Under the existing major in Do. 5th day of December 1788; and acquaintances. Under the existing Commiss'd a 1st major in Do, 5th day of December 1791; Commiss'd Lieut. Colo. Com'd't of Meck. 6th Militia, 5th day of December 1795; Do Brig'd Gen'l 11th Brigade N. C. Mil'a, 5th Day of December 1805; Do Maj. Gen'l 4th Div'n N. C. Militia, 4th day of Decem-

I am sure that if a large prize was drawn in your State and shown around, that thousands
