CITY FATHERS.

Called Meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

The board met in called session vesterday afternoon at the mayor's office. Present, Mayor Smith, Aldermen Ta-tem, Sanders, Wilson, Nisbet, Scott, Weddington, Butler, Walker and Dowd. Col. H. C. Jones appeared before the board as the representative of a committee composed of himself, Maj. C. Dowd, R. M. Miller, W. J. Yates and Mayor Smith from a citizens' meeting, to ask an appropriation for printing, for purposes of general distribution, the proceedings of the late Northern mens' convention held in this city. He showed in remarks of some length the material advantages to the country which were likely to result from this meeting, by the emphatic disapproval of stories which tend to keep an intelligent class of Northern people from settling in this and other Southern States. His argument was that whatever improvement in the condition of this section or any section of North Carolina might result from the information which they might, by this means, be able to disseminate, Charlotte would reap a full share of this benefit. His committee asked that the sum of \$100 be contributed by the city; they hoped and expected to be able to secure the remaining funds necessary for thier purpose from the railroad companies and from private sum asked.

Alderman Dowd and others made a few remarks in advocacy of the appropriation, and on motion of Alderman ed. There was a heavy gash in the top sanders the sum was granted. The Pioneer fire company was al-
