guardian bonds. Mr. Robinson moved to indefinitely and 300 copies to be printed for the use of that body. The commissioners are to have a clerk at a salary of \$300, but postpone. Carried. S. B. 233, to amend the landlord and

tenant act. Mr. Bynum moved to indefinitely postpone. Carried. S. B. 224, to allow the people of North Carolina to elect their commissioners. Mr. Dortch moved to indefinitely postpone. Mr. Ormand called for the aves and nays. The motion to postpone was carried by a vote of 22 to 15. H. B. 7, S. B. 190, to define the juris-

diction of justices of the peace. Mr. Caldwell moved to indefinitely postpone. Carried. S. B. 259, to regulate sureties on official bonds. The bill provides that lawyers may go on the bonds of public officials as their sureties.

Mr. McEachern moved to insert "farmers" after the word "attorneys." Mr. Ormand moved to amend by inserting "civilians, doctors, preachers, mechanics and hucksters," after the words "attorneys and farmers."

After a lengthy and spirited debate upon the passage of the bill, and the danger that would arise from it should it pass. Mr. Dortch stated that he knew now of two members of Congress who were elected, no doubt, because they allowed their names to go on such bonds as sureties. Mr. Merritt moved to indefinitely

The Senate was again called to order. CALENDAR RESUMED. S. B. 43, in regard to the seduction of women. Provides that any person se-ducing a woman, under the promise of marriage, shall be guilty of a misde-meanor, and shall be fined not less than \$50, and imprisoned in the penitentiary not less than 3 years. Several amendments were offered but voted down. Mr. Leach asked to be excused from voting on the final reading of the bill,

on the ground that he was in favor of fine and imprisonment in jail at the discretion of the judge, but opposed to confinement in the penitentiary-that this would encourage perjury among the less scrupulous of both races, that he had sought to have stricken out the infamous part of the punishment and

The bill then passed its final reading by a vote of 29 to 8, ordered to be en-grossed and sent to the House of Representatives.

REVISAL OF THE LAWS. S. B. 14, H. B. 168, in regard to revising the laws of the State, which was made the special order for noon to-day, was ing of concealed weapons. Propositions taken up. It provides for the appointant grievances. Governor to whom shall be entrusted the work of collection and revision of all the statute laws of the State, including those passed by the General Assembly; to reduce into the compass of one act all those laws which can be properly consolidated, following the arrangement and plan of the revised code of 1854; to use all means to make plain the laws; and to designate such changes and modifications as are deemed advisable. mission to the next General Assembly,

in the bill there is no provision for

compensation for the commissioners. To this bill an amendment was offered by Mr. Vaughan, to take from the Governor the appointive power by saying that W. B. Rodman, George N. Folk and John S. Henderson be appointed commissioners to do the work of revision. He spoke to the amendment and said that he offered it after consultation with the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, who both desired the General Assembly to make the choice. He then spoke of the gentlemen whose names were given, saying that they were put forward in no personal spirit, but simply for their fitness for the position. Judge Rodman, the only iving member of the former commission, is perhaps one of the best men in the State for the place, while Mr. Folk is without a superior in research and patient and careful study of the law. Mr. Henderson, though a young man, is eminently fitted, and it was desired to have a younger member on the commission, that he might advise in future

revisions. Mr. Lewis favored the codification of the laws, as they were now so mixed that lawyers did not understand them. He desired the commission to be appointed by the Governor, for if the House attempts to elect it, it will consume days of precious time, and perhaps to no purpose, as there would be numberless nominations. He wished the bill to pass as it came from the Sen-

Mr. Lindsay offered an amendment that there be two commissioners, with a clerk at \$500. Mr. Powers offered one to give the

Supreme Court the power to appoint the commissioners. Mr. Jones added his endorsement to the three eminent gentlemen named by Mr. Vaughan, saying that all were pe-culiarly fitted for the position, and desired the passage of the amendment of-

fered by that gentleman. Mr. Covington offered an amendment to Mr. Vaughan's amendment, by striking out all names, thus simply saying the General Assembly choose the com-

Mr. Carter, of Buncombe, desired the appointive power to rest in the Gov-

ernor. Mr. Covington spoke on the bill, saying the people favored it, not the law-yers, perhaps, but the farmers, of whom there were in the House a large majority, and who had passed it in the Senate. The way to choose is to appoint a joint committee of 13 and let them weigh the merits of the nominees, or else, we can

make choice in caucus. Mr. Bost favored the adoption of Mr. Vaughan's amendment. Mr. Foard spoke of the name and claims of Mr. Marshall Clement, of Davie, and, continuing said the Governor was peculiar-ly fitted to make the selection, as he was a lawyer and knows every lawyer in the State, his merits, etc. Mr. Cooke was in favor of concurrence in the resolution as it came from the Senate. The people of the State trustfully entrust the selection to the Governor. Mr. Turner did not see the necessity of the bill, or of having more than one commission-

er in the revision.

The previous question was then called and Mr. Covington's amendment to Mr. Vaughan's amendment, which struck out names, was lost. Mr. Vaughan's amendment, naming

the members of the commission, then failed to pass by a vote of 44 ayes to 49 The amendment by Mr. Lindsay to say two commissioners and clerk at \$500, then failed to pass.

Mr. Powers' amendment, to let the Supreme Court choose, was lost. The vote then recurring upon the original bill, it passed its second read-

On motion to suspend the rules to put it upon its third reading, the ayes and nays were called, when the rules were not suspended, not two-thirds of the House voting in favor of suspension. The vote stood 53 to 45. H. B. 15, in regard to a term of the Superior Court in Union county, chang-

ing its time, passed its readings. GOVERNOR VANCE'S RESIGNATION. A message was received from his Excellency the Governor, transmitting the following:

To the Honorable, the General Assembly of North Carolina: Having received official information of my election as a Senator in the Congress of the United States from the State of North Carolina, for the term commencing on the 4th of March, next, I hereby tender my resignation as Governor of this State, to take effect on Wednesday, the 5th day of February, 1879. In thus surrendering into your hands the great trust which was placed in mine by the people of North Carolina in 1876, in order to accept another to which their rep-

resentatives have thought it proper to transfer me, I deem it not unbecoming to say that I find it impossible adequately to express the thanks of which my heart is so full, for this last and greatest expression of the confidence of my countrymen. To have inspired such a feeling fills me with grateful pride, and to deserve it shall constitute the sole aim of the remaining years of my existence, and to which all that I have and

am shall be sacredly dedicated.

With earnest wishes for the health and happiness of each individual member of your honorable bodies, and with fervent prayers for the prosperity and honor of our native land, I am, gentlemen
