Drummers' Tax-A Misapprehension. Some misapprehension seems to exist in reference to an ordinance recently passed by the board of aldermen, inposing a tax on a certain class of drummers. The impression is that the ordinance taxes all drummers, whereas in point of fact it only applies to that class who take orders from individuals, and is to protect our own people who pay their privilege or license tax, against a class of peddlers of all descriptions, merchant-tailors and others. The proviso in the ordinance reads: "That nothing contained in this ordinanace shall be construed to apply to traveling salesmen, representing wholesale

Rotten Hose. Prof. Cain's Book. THE OBSERVER is indebted to the author, Capt. Wm. Cain, of the Carolina Military Institute, for a copy of his recent book, "Practical Theory of Voussoir Arches, Applied to Stone Bridges, Tunnels, Drains and Ground Arches," being No. 42 in Van Nostrand's Science Series. The Observer has before alluded to the prominence which the book has taken among civil engineers, and now takes occasion to copy the following notice of the work from the March number of "Van Nostrand's Engineering Magazine," recognized authority in the matters of which this book treats:

"Scarcely any branch of practical engineering offers so many difficulties to he young engineer as the construction of the Voussoir arch. The theoretical examples of the books fail to meet in his mind the practical requirements. So he often follows precedent and works from copy or by rule of thumb, and completes the work in ignorance whether such failures as these may lie on the side of clumsiness or insecurity, with a ingering fear that, taken as a whole, the structure possesses both of these qualities. Prof. Cain has previously given us so complete a discussion of the principles involved in the practical construction of arches (Science Series No. 12) that experienced engineers have employed it as a guide in important works. Taken with the present work, a treatise is afforded whose completeness, in a practical point of view, is scarcely come justly celebrated only on account of MERIT: equalled by anything else in the Engish language."

August Wilhelmj.
