WASHINGTON NEWS. Maj. Reno Acquitted-Explanation of the Pension Law - Interview

with the President-The Ex-

tra Session, &c. WASHINGTON, March 5.- The War Department has promulgated the report of the court of inquiry in the conduct of Major Reno, at the battle of the Little Big Horn, fought June 25th and 26th, 1876. After reciting the events of that battle, as testified to before the court, the report says the conduct of the officers throughout was excellent, and while subordinates in some instances did more for the safety of the command by brilliant displays of courage than did Major Reno, there was nothing in

his conduct that requires animadversion from this court. The recently enacted law giving three months extra pay to officers and soldiers and to officers, seamen and marines employed in the war with Mexico, does not include those in the volunteer service who have already received three months extra pay under the provisions of the act of July 19th,

It having been mentioned by a visitor to the President to-day that much surprise and dissatisfaction was expressed at his calling an extra session so soon after the adjournment of the late Congress, the President replied that the proclamation for that purpose was issued on information that the earliest practicable day would be acceptable to the majority of the members elect, although it was natural that some of those re-elected and living at remote distances from the capitol might complain as they would not have time mean while to visit their families and return. The President was inject of the Democrats through Senator Beck to insist on the enactment of certain measures as a condition for granting supplies.
