I believe any people situated as we were ought to be cautioned against placing implicit confidence in evidence given at a time of high excitement. There never was a day, there never was an hour, that I did not believe Mrs. Surratt was as innocent a woman as there is in this hall. [Applause.] She was the keeper of a boarding house in Washington. 
