STATE NEWS.

Iredell Inferior Court commences Monday.

Mr. David Lewis, Lumberton's oldest citizen, is dead.

Cleveland horses and mules are dying of blind staggers.

Capt. John N. Maffitt is to be memorial day orator in Wilmington.

Rev. F. M. Jordan baptised fifteen persons at Laurinburg last Sunday.

Ben. Croom killed T. P. Jacobs, colored, in Pender county on the 19th March.

Mrs. Anthony Devose's new girl baby weighed 17 lbs. when born. New Hanover.

A fine Durham cow dropped dead in the streets of Greensboro, Wednesday evening.

Only three cases on the State docket of Alleghany court. Good for the county, but bad for the solicitor.

The State treasurer received \$34,800 of bonds for exchange under the new compromise act, Tuesday.

The Lumberton Robesonian warns the public against the "Anglo-American Musical Company," of New York.

Geo. H. Snow was elected attorney for the board of commissioners of Wake county but declined and E. R. Stamps was elected.

A Wake county revenue captured a colored moonshiner with a considerable amount of the o-be-joyful in the embryonic state.

Rev. Dr. T. H. Pritchard, pastor of the First Baptist church of Raleigh, is urged to become president of Wake Forest College.

Coal—a continuation of the Egyptian vein—has been discovered in the upper part of Robeson, according to the Robesonian's Shoe Heel reporter.

The Newbern Nut Shell reports a revenue raid in Lenoir: results, one dollar with the jim-jams, a still, 50 gallons of whisky and 1,000 gallons of beer.

The Patriot says the work of grading the Cape Fear and Yadon Valley Railroad will be begun by 100 convicts at the Greensboro end of the road the 1st of May.

There will be a meeting of the Democratic voters of Statesville at the court house Saturday evening at 7 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for mayor.

The question of consolidating Winston and Salem will be voted on the 19th. We learn from private sources that there is no prospect of Winston agreeing to the proposition.

The Patriot says the investigation in the case of the painter, Clements, arrested on suspicion of being implicated in the murder of J. W. S. Parker, of Greensboro, resulted in nothing.

The Star says that some time during Monday night the robbery store of Mr. C. H. Wessell, of Wilmington, was entered and robbed of three watches, one gold and two silver, three revolvers, and about twenty dollars in money.

The Durham Tobacco Plant says the reduction of tax on tobacco will give new life to the trade all over this land, and Durham will feel its effects as much as any other point. Already the town is beginning to feel the influence of a better trade.

The Wilmington Review says that the losses by fire in North Carolina were: In 1876, \$1,181,000; in 1877, \$3,600,000; in 1878, \$3,740,000, and in 1879, \$2,400,000. The amount paid by insurance companies on these losses was: 1876, \$48,700; 1877, \$247,100; 1878, \$265,000; total, \$560,800.

The old officers of the Wilmington cotton mills have been re-elected, as follows: Donald MacIntee, president; Wm. A. French, vice-president; Walter G. MacRae, secretary and treasurer; Directors—Edward Kidd, Jno. W. Atkinson, F. W. Kerchner, J. H. Cladbourne, and B. G. Worth.

Greensboro Patriot: Mr. Jas. Donnell lost a mare last Thursday, while crossing Weatherly's dam. The mare, hitched with a mule to a wagon, got frightened at a fire below and the nose of a saw-mill and jumped off into the pond carrying Mr. Donnell, mule and wagon with her. The mule was saved by cutting the harness, but the mare was drowned.

Winston Sentinel: The house of Lydia Spaulhour, of Surry, widow of Chas. Spaulhour, was burned on Sunday, the 30th ult. Lost almost everything. She is an unfortunate woman—her husband was killed a few years ago by the kick of a horse; a son was burned to death by the cap of a still bursting; a grandchild was burned to death in the kitchen; and her father was frozen to death.

Washington special to Baltimore Gazette: The contested election case from the second North Carolina district, O'Hara against Kitchin, will probably not be much of a case as the fact will be established by Kitchin's counsel that O'Hara was not at the time of the election a naturalized citizen of the United States. In his allegation of contest he does not charge Kitchin with fraud in the election. This case will be disposed of soon and Kitchin will remain seated.

Winston Sentinel: At a meeting of the committee of Confederate Soldiers' Survivors Association, it was determined to call a meeting of the old soldiers at Winston on Memorial Day, May 10th, for the purpose of observing that day and to decorate the graves of the Confederate buried here, and to perfect the organization already commenced and to fix upon some early day for a general re-union of all the Confederate soldiers in this section.

The Star says the sixth annual meeting of the members and policy holders of the Wilmington Mutual Insurance Company was held at the city hall Monday night, at 8 o'clock. Messrs. Wm. A. French, Wm. Larkins, John H. Freeman, F. W. Foster, R. E. Heide, H. Von-Glahn, R. J. Johnson, R. S. Hadfield, J. K. Brown, John London, R. E. Calder, and W. P. Oldham were elected directors. Wm. A. French was elected president, J. K. Brown, vice president, and Saml' N. Cannon, secretary.

Wilmington Star: Louisa Jones, one of the five young colored women who were captured in the raid upon the "Long Houses" on Wednesday night last, and who was sentenced by the inferior court to be confined in the city prison for thirty days, died Tuesday morning. The physician of the mayor was called to the delicate condition of her health, and she was released from custody soon after the adjournment of the court on the morning she was sentenced.
