Where the Family Came From-How the Young Man Started in Life.

e Editor Statesnil American: DEAR SIR-I have noticed an article

DEAR SIR—I have noticed an article in your paper of the 12th inst., on the subject of the ancestors of the present Secretary of War, Geo. W. McCrary, being from your State and county.

As I have the ability to give positive information on the subject, I would inform you that the said McCrary, said by Mr. Sharpe to have emigrated from there to Tennessee, was the grandfather of the said secretary, and I the eldest son of the said John McCrary, am the father of the secretary. I was born in the State of North Carolina, Iredell county, on the 22d day of November, 1797. When my father left that State, I was about 8 or 9 years of age; we lived in Tennessee about six years; we emigrated from there to Indiana, where I spent the best portion of my life. I I spent the best portion of my life. I married there, my wife was a native of Harrison county, Kentucky; there our children were principally born, George W. being our seventh son, was born there and was only six weeks old when we left there for lowa, where we have lived ever since.

George, at a very early age, manifested a very great desire for learning. I sent him to school with the other children antil he was 15 years of age, he then wanted to go to the academy. I was in very moderate circumstances at that time, and told him I could not afford to give him that privilege, as I had many other children to educate, and wished to give them all an equal chance. He to give them all an equal chance. He said: "Father, I know that is so, but just give me my time and I will pay my own way." I told him if he thought he could, he was at liberty to try it. He went and hired to pack brick and mor-tar to brick-layers who were building a house; as soon as the job was done and got his wages, he went right to the academy. I then helped all I could and made out to pay for his first term. He then had made such progress that he got his tuition for his services as an assistant teacher. He then taught school a few terms and afterwards went into the study of law with the firm of Ranken & Miller, in the city of Keokuk; after studying a year was admitted to the bar, and after practicing law awhile he was elected to the State Legislature,

he was elected to the State Legislature, and after serving one term in the lower house he was elected to the Senate. During his service in the Legislature was the war of the rebellion.
