Since the organization of the General Assembly in 1861, the Southern Presbyterian Church has greatly increased in influence and membership, although it had to encounter the unfavorable conditions engendered by several years of war and the distracting period of wrong and tyranny growing out of the carpet-bag regime. There are now 12 synods, 64 presbyteries, 1,117 ministers and li-centiates, 145 candidates for the ministry, 1,878 churches, 5,428 elders, 3,452 deacons, 114,578 communicants and 68,-121 Sunday school children, showing an increase of churches and membership of over fifty per cent. The contributions to all objects reported last year were \$1,030,971. The Church has two fine theological seminaries, one in Virginia and the other in South Carolina, and a school for preparing colored men to preach the gospel, at Tuskaloosa, Ala. Many of the most remarkable and distinguished clergymen of the United States have been connected with the Presbyterian Church in the Southern

States, and to-day the roll call of the General Assembly which meets in Louisville Thursday will reveal a fine array of distinguished names—men who not such tough topics as "grace and free will," predestination and election, the grace and eloquence of presentation.
The Geneva theology compels deep thinking on the part of its votaries. It is a "hard and cruel system" according its.
