The Question of Congressional Adjournment-Four Per Cent. Speculations-The All-Night Session of the House.

[Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun.] WASHINGTON, May 25.—A Democratic Senator, in conversation as to the grocery house in Augusta, Ga. The prospects of a final adjournment, said sale of liquors was a leading feature he had noticed that all the presidential candidates in the Senate were either indifferent as to the length of the sesindifferent as to the length of the session or were actively in favor of protracting it. THE SPECULATIVE MANIA. The sale of the ten-dollar four per cent. certificates has been the means of putting into the hands of speculators throughout the country a great many thousand dollars, and it has been suggested that there is good reason why the government should not have the benefit of this instead of the speculators. The mania for buying these certificates to speculate in seized such hold of the treasury clerks last week that many of them were scarcely at their desks at all, and finally it was found necessary to remind them of the law forbidding treasury employees to deal in government securities. It is some-what queer that from the time of the first loan of the war down to this day all the legislation in respect to the government finances has had the effect to encourage and foster speculation, and in many instances enormous sums have gone into the pockets of individuals

which might just as well have been saved to the treasury. THE ALL-NIGHT PERFORMANCE. The House sat in continuous session from noon Friday till 9 o'clock on Sat-urday morning. Seventeen hours of this time was consumed in filibustering by the Republicans because the Democrats would not permit a certain amend-ment to the Warner silver bill to be voted on. The whole performance was equally silly and absurd on both sides. Both Republicans and Democrats knew that the amendment would not be adopted, and that it could be disposed of in a very few minutes, and yet, because neither one side nor the other would give up, the undignified squabble went on through the whole night. There was no excuse for the performance, and the Democrats, finally coming to this conclusion, permitted the amendment to be offered. There were several calls of the House in the course of the night, attended by the usual scenes of uproar. Mr. McCook, of New York, when brought before the bar of the House made use of certain offen-sive and disrespectful language toward the body of which he is a member, which he afterwards found expedient to retract and apologize for. 


