JET O M PATAL EXPENSION.

The Viblent Denti of Afexander Tur-rentine by the Burnting of an Over-charged Soda Fountain.

Alexander Turrentine, colored, has been in the service of the firm of L. R. Wriston & Co., ever since it was established, over a year ago, and was regarded as an intelligent, faithful and trustworthy negro. One of his duties was to charge the soda fountain, which he has done regularly when it was in use ever since he has been in the employ of the firm. He was a little late beginning the task yesterday morning, but went about it as usual. Between 8 and 9 o'clock persons standing near the door leading into the cellar of the store where Turrentine was working with the fountain were shocked by an ex-plosion, which resembled the sound caused by the falling of a heavy piece of timber. Dr. T. J. Moore, who was standing near the entrance to the cellar, went down and found Turrentine lying near the fountain in a dying condition. As soon as an examination could be made, it was ascertained that the bones of his skull immediately around the eye had been badly broken and mashed in. He died in a very few minutes. The fountain had burst in the middle where it was encircled by a band, and from the surrounding circumstances it was readily seen that the upper part of it had struck Turrentine while he was standing over it. A mark on the joists above indicated that the upper part had been thrown against it, while the lower portion was forced in the other direction. Persons in the store distinctly felt the jar caused by a part of the fountain striking the floor.

The explosion was not loud enough to attract general attention in the street, but in a few minutes great excitement the State by the State board of educaprevailed. The doors had finally to be closed and subsequently the body was removed to a house on Fifth street,

Only a few witnesses were examined and the facts developed were substantially those stated above. Mr. F. Keuster testified that he had recently been working on the fountain and that he considered it perfectly safe, and in reply to questions said that he was an expert in such matters, having been working with soda fountains regularly for the past eight years. The jury rendered a verdict of death by the explosion of a soda fountain.
